<u>COVID-19 Statement:</u> This report includes employment projection data by EMSI. EMSI's projections are modeled on recorded (historical) employment figures and incorporate several underlying assumptions, including the assumption that the economy during the projection period will be at approximately full employment or potential output. To the extent that a recession or labor shock, such as the economic effects of COVID-19, can cause long-term structural change, they may impact the projections. At this time, it is not possible to quantify the impact of COVID-19 on projections of industry and occupational employment. Other measures such as unemployment rates and monthly industry employment estimates will reflect the most recent information on employment and jobs in the state and, in combination with input from local employers, may help validate current and future employment needs as depicted here.



Summary of Findings

The Central Valley/Mother Lode Center of Excellence was asked by West Hills College Lemoore to provide labor market information for the 12 industry sectors/occupational groupings critical to the economic vitality of the college's service area, namely Fresno, Kings, and Tulare counties. For each sector, this report examines current employment and projected occupational demand for low-skill and middle-skill jobs. Middle-skill jobs require more than a high school education but less than a bachelor's degree, making these occupations relevant to community college education. Whereas, many low- and middle-skill occupations can be relevant to adult education. In reviewing the data presented in this report, please keep in mind that forecasts are still being adjusted to reflect the economic impact of Covid-19 and may not accurately represent employer demand.

In the following report sections, occupational wages, educational attainment, and postsecondary supply are shown for each occupational grouping/industry sector. (Information on the report's methodology can be found in Appendix A.) Analysis by the Center of Excellence examined whether postsecondary institutions are supplying enough students to meet workforce demand. This analysis identified sectors with substantial projected growth and job openings and compared those sectors with postsecondary programs preparing students to enter occupations within those sectors. In the college's service area, the 12 sectors are expected to offer 83,039 low-skill and middle-skill job openings annually. A large proportion of job openings, a total of 26,879, are projected for the retail, hospitality, and tourism sector (Exhibit 1). The agriculture, water, and environmental technologies sector is projected to offer 15,089 annual openings, followed by the business and entrepreneurship sector with 11,244 annual openings.

Exhibit 1. Comparison of workforce demand and postsecondary supply for the 12 industry sectors



A comparison of postsecondary supply and projected workforce demand shows several substantial supply gaps. A shortage of more than 26,000 workers is projected for the retail, hospitality, and tourism sector; however, it is important to keep in mind that employment in this sector has declined dramatically in recent months, and there is speculation that many temporary job losses may become permanent. The agriculture, water, and environmental technologies sector is expected to have a shortage of 14,687 workers. In the college's service area and CVML region, strategic planning is imperative for the business sector, which will have a large supply gap in the service area, a shortage of 9,851 workers. The logistics sector is projected to have a shortage of 6,529 workers, and energy, construction, and utilities is projected to have a shortage of 4,663 workers. Many occupations in the business and entrepreneurship, logistics, and energy, construction, and utilities sectors pay strong wages that can assist students in achieving an improved quality of life. The college is strongly encouraged to consider supporting programs that train workers to enter these sectors.

Planning efforts should take into account occupations with strong workforce demand. The occupations with the most annual openings in the college's service area include:

- Farmworkers and laborers, crop, nursery, and greenhouse, 10,018 annual openings (low-skill)
- Laborers and freight, stock, and material movers (hand), 2,016 annual openings (low-skill)
- Office clerks (general), 1,560 annual openings
- Heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers, 1,401 annual openings
- Teacher assistants, 1,396 annual openings
- Stock clerks and order fillers, 1,231 annual openings (low-skill)
- Secretaries and administrative assistants, except legal, medical, and executive, 1,034 annual openings
- Customer service representatives, 958 annual openings

The retail, hospitality, and tourism sector has six occupations that each have more than 1,000 annual openings, but these occupations should be considered with caution as this sector has been greatly impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Occupations that pose a concern for training are those projected to contract over the next five years. These include:

- Farmers, ranchers, and other agricultural managers, a loss of 669 positions, a 7% decline
- Farmworkers and laborers, crop, nursery, and greenhouse, a loss of 411 positions, a 1% decline
- Farmworkers, farm, ranch, and aquacultural animals, a loss of 345 positions, an 8% decline
- Childcare workers, a loss of 223 positions, a 4% decline
- Security guards, a loss of 204 positions, a 6% decline

It is also important to keep in mind occupations that offer solid wages in conjunction with moderate to strong workforce demand. Industry sectors with these types of jobs include health care, business and entrepreneurship, and logistics. Within health care, occupations that have a promising outlook and that can lead to improved quality of life for socioeconomically disadvantaged students include dental hygienists, registered nurses, psychiatric technicians, and licensed vocational nurses. Business and entrepreneurship occupations include general and operations managers; claims adjusters, examiners, and investigators; and human resources specialists. Within logistics, occupations include transportation, storage, and distribution managers; and logisticians.

On average each year, postsecondary institutions in the service area confer 11,814 awards (degrees and certificates) in areas related to the 12 industry sectors. The greatest number of awards are in health care, 4,732, followed by business and entrepreneurship, 1,394, and education, 1,147.







Appendix A: Methodology & Data Sources

Data Sources

Labor market and educational supply data compiled in this report derive from a variety of sources. Data were drawn from external sources, including the Economic Modeling Specialists, Inc., the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office Management Information Systems Data Mart, and the National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES) Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS). Below is the summary of the data sources found in this study.

Labor Market Information/Population Estimates and Projections/Educational Attainment	Economic Modeling Specialists, Intl. (EMSI). EMSI occupational employment data are based on final EMSI industry data and final EMSI staffing patterns. Occupational wage estimates also affected by county-level EMSI earnings by industry: economicmodeling.com.

Key Terms and Concepts

Annual Job Openings: Annual openings are calculated by dividing the number of years in the projection period by total job openings.

Education Attainment Level: The highest education attainment level of workers age 25 years or older.

Employment Estimate: The total number of workers currently employed.

Employment Projections: Projections of employment are calculated by a proprietary Economic Modeling Specialists, Intl. (EMSI) formula that includes historical employment and economic indicators along with national, state, and local trends.

Living Wage: The cost of living in a specific community or region for one adult and no children. The cost increases with the addition of children.

Occupation: An occupation is a grouping of job titles that have a similar set of activities or tasks that employees perform.

Percent Change: Rate of growth or decline in the occupation for the projected period; this does not factor in replacement openings.

Replacements: Estimate of job openings resulting from workers retiring or otherwise permanently leaving an occupation. Workers entering an occupation often need training. These replacement needs, added to job openings due to growth, may be used to assess the minimum number of workers who will need to be trained for an occupation.

Total Job Openings (New + Replacements): Sum of projected growth (new jobs) and replacement needs. When an occupation is expected to lose jobs, or retain the current employment level, number of openings will equal replacements.

Typical Education Requirement: represents the typical education level most workers need to enter an occupation.

Typical On-The-Job Training: indicates the typical on-the-job training needed to attain competency in the skills needed in the occupation.
