

Program Endorsement Brief: 1301.00/Family and Consumer Sciences, General Non-Credit Customer Service for Retail Industry

The Orange County Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (COE) prepared this report to provide Los Angeles/Orange County regional labor market supply and demand data related to one middle-skill occupation: customer service representatives (43-4051), and one below middle-skill occupation: retail salespersons (41-2031). Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree. This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with the relevant occupations.

Based on the available data, there appears to be a supply gap for retail industry customer service occupations in the region. Furthermore, the majority of annual openings for these occupations have entry-level wages below the living wage in both Los Angeles and Orange counties. While the majority of annual openings for occupations in this report typically require no formal education, more than one-third of current workforce has completed some college or holds an associate degree. Therefore, due to some of the criteria being met, the COE endorses this proposed program. Detailed reasons include:

Demand:

- Supply Gap Criteria Over the next five years, there is projected to be 33,910 jobs
 available annually in the region due to workers leaving the field, which is more than
 the 679 awards conferred annually by educational institutions in the region.
 - However, the customer service representatives (43-4051) SOC code includes this
 occupation across all industries, not solely retail. Therefore, the number of annual

All occupations that require an educational requirement of some college, associate degree or apprenticeship;

All occupations that require a bachelor's degree, but also have more than one-third of their existing labor force with an educational attainment of some college or associate degree; or

[•] All occupations that require a high school diploma or equivalent or no formal education, but also require short- to long-term on-the-job training where multiple community colleges have existing programs.

- job openings for customer service representatives in the retail industry is overstated.
- Over the past 12 months, there were 25,103 online job postings related to these occupations within the retail industry. The highest number of job postings were for sales associates, retail sales associates, retail store associates, customer service associates, and customer service representatives.
- Living Wage Criteria Within Orange County, all of annual job openings for these retail industry customer service occupations have entry-level wages below the county's living wage (\$17.36/hour).²
- Educational Criteria Within the LA/OC region, 68% of the annual job openings for retail industry customer service occupations typically require no formal education.
 - However, the national-level educational attainment data indicates between 38 and 42.1% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree.

Supply:

- There are 7 community colleges in the LA/OC region that issue awards related to sales, customer service and/or consumer sciences, conferring an average of 47 awards annually between 2016 and 2019.
- Between 2014 and 2017, there was an average of 632 awards conferred annually in related training programs by non-community college institutions throughout the region.

Occupational Demand

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for these retail industry customer service occupations. In Los Angeles/Orange County, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to slightly decrease by less than 1% through 2024. However, there will be nearly 34,000 job openings per year through 2024 due to retirements and workers leaving the field. It is important to note that the *customer service representatives* SOC code includes customer service representatives across all industries, not solely retail. Therefore, the data in Exhibit 1 is overstated for customer service representatives in the retail industry.

This report includes employment projection data by Emsi which uses EDD information. Emsi's projections are modeled on recorded (historical) employment figures and incorporate several underlying assumptions, including the assumption that the economy, during the projection period, will be at approximately full employment. To the extent that a recession or labor shock, such as the economic effects of COVID-19, can cause long-term structural change, it may impact the projections. At this time, it is not possible to quantify the impact of COVID-19 on projections of industry and occupational employment. Therefore, the projections included in this report do not take the impacts of COVID-19 into account.

Wages

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for retail industry customer service occupations in Orange County as they relate to the county's living wage. Los Angeles County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the LA/OC region. Detailed wage information, by county, is included in Appendix A.

Orange County— All of the annual openings for retail industry customer service occupations have entry-level wages below the living wage for one adult (\$17.36 in Los Angeles County). Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$12.60 and \$14.89, which is lower than the living wage. Entry-level wages for *retail salespersons* are \$12.60, which is below the living wage as well as lower than California's current minimum wage for employers with 26 or more employees (\$13.00/hour).⁴ Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$17.38 and \$23.66, which are higher than the living wage estimate. Orange County's average wages are below the average statewide wage of \$18.12 for these occupations.

Los Angeles County— All of the annual openings for retail industry customer service occupations have entry-level wages below the living wage for one adult (\$15.04 in Los Angeles County). Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$12.62 and \$14.78. Entry-level wages for retail salespersons are \$12.62, which is below the living wage as well as lower than California's current minimum wage for employers with 26 or more employees (\$13.00/hour).⁵ Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$17.89 and \$23.52, which are higher than the living wage estimate. Los Angeles County's average wages are below the average statewide wage of \$18.12 for these occupations.

Job Postings

There were 25,103 online job postings related to customer service in the retail industry listed in the past 12 months. The highest number of job postings were for sales associates, retail sales associates, retail store associates, customer service associates, and customer service representatives. The top skills were: sales/retail sales, customer service, retail industry knowledge, merchandising, and customer contact. The top three employers, by number of job postings, in the region were: Lowe's Companies, Macy's, and 99 Cents Only Stores.

It is important to note that the job postings data included in this section reflects online job postings listed in the past 12 months and does not yet demonstrate the impact of COVID-19. While employers

have generally posted fewer online job postings since the beginning of the pandemic, the long-term effects are currently unknown.

Educational Attainment

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists no formal education as the typical entry-level education for retail salespersons and a high school diploma for customer service representatives. In the LA/OC region, the majority of annual job openings (68%) typically requires no formal education. However, the national-level educational attainment data indicates between 38 and 42.1% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree. Of the 40% of retail customer service job postings listing a minimum education requirement in Los Angeles/Orange County, 96% (9,699) requested a high school diploma and 4% (393) requested an associate degree.

Educational Supply

Community College Supply—Exhibit 2 shows the three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in the related TOP codes: Sales and Salesmanship (0509.40), Customer Service (0518.00), and Family and Consumer Sciences, General (1301.00). The colleges with the most completions in the region are: East LA and Santa Monica. Over the past 12 months, there were three other related program recommendation requests from regional community colleges.

Non-Community College Supply—For a comprehensive regional supply analysis, it is also important to consider the supply from other institutions in the region that provide training programs for consumer sciences. Exhibit 3 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by these institutions in the related Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) Code: Family and Consumer Sciences/Human Sciences, General (19.0101). Due to different data collection periods, the most recent three-year period of available data is from 2014 to 2017. Between 2014 and 2017, four-year colleges in the region conferred an average of 632 awards annually in related training programs.
