# **PUBLIC SAFETY SECTOR PROFILE**

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## Key Findings from the Los Angeles County Sector Analysis Project


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### Introduction


To support the collaborative planning and development of career education (CE) programs and to inform regional investments in Los Angeles County, the Los Angeles County Center of Excellence has developed a series of sector profiles highlighting trends in the labor market and postsecondary education and training programs addressing local hiring needs.

These profiles highlight in-demand, well-paid middle-skill jobs—those jobs that typically require some form of education or training beyond a high school diploma, but less than a bachelor's degree. These occupations are a critical component of the workforce overall and support the economic vitality of the region and state.

This profile of the public safety sector summarizes key findings on current and projected workforce demand, hourly wages, job postings, and program and training data from area community colleges and proprietary schools. The public safety sector encompasses three related fields—law enforcement, firefighting, and specialized public safety roles—that provide direct protection to the public against crime, fire, disasters, and other threats.<sup>1</sup>



## Student Demographics



<sup>1</sup> Impact of the COVID-19 pandemic: This profile relies largely on 2019 employment and education data preceding the pandemic. The exception is job posting data from 2020. Due to severe economic impacts from the pandemic, job posting data should not be considered an accurate depiction of employer demand; however, the frequency of certain data points can provide insights into the types of workers and skill sets that employers are seeking. Annual job openings are derived from the labor market analytics firm Emsi whose projections are modeled on recorded (historical) employment figures and incorporate several underlying assumptions, including the assumption that the economy during the projection period will be at approximately full employment or potential output. At this time, it is not possible to quantify the economic impact of COVID-19 on projections of occupational employment.

### **Student Employment Outcomes**

Data on community college students who exiting public safety programs in Los Angeles County shows that approximately 68% in the 2016-17 academic year obtained employment is a job closely related to their field of study. On average, these students earned a median income of \$31,716 after exiting a public safety program.



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### **Employment Demand Analysis**

Seven middle-skill occupations account for 34,065 jobs in law enforcement and combined have 2,742 projected annual openings (new + replacement jobs). The largest occupation, by far, is police and sheriff's patrol officers. This occupation is projected to have the most job openings, 2,053.

A search of online job postings shows 1,851 postings related to law enforcement in 2020 in Los Angeles County. The top five law enforcement occupations were listed in 1,842 out of 1,851 postings.

### **Law Enforcement**



Indicating an occupational niche related to port operations in the county, there were 30 postings for import specialists and 15 postings for ocean import specialists. These job titles are typically associated with the occupation of immigration and customs inspectors, which falls within detectives and criminal investigators.

#### Police officer and investigator comprise the two most common job titles in job postings.


Exhibit 5. Top job titles in job postings

In Los Angeles County, employers who posted the most ads for law enforcement job vacancies were healthcare providers, and local and federal government agencies. Deloitte appears as a top employer due to job postings for intelligence analysts, an occupation typically grouped under detectives and criminal investigators.

Top skills requested in job postings were surveillance, and public health and safety. Quantitative abilities also figured highly with 515 postings for skills such as financial analysis, statistical reporting, and data mining.

### **Education & Training Supply Analysis**

In Los Angeles County, 19 community colleges and 12 proprietary schools offer programs related to law enforcement. In the 2019-20 academic year, community colleges conferred 2,810 awards and proprietary schools conferred 1,003 awards.



### Firefighting

### 📙 Employment Demand Analysis

Four middle-skill occupations account for 8,780 jobs in firefighting and combined have 691 projected annual openings. The largest occupation, firefighters, has substantially more jobs than any other occupation in this category. This occupation also is projected to have the most job openings, 622.

A search of online job postings shows 277 postings related to firefighting in 2020 in Los Angeles County. The most advertised occupations were firefighters and supervisors of firefighters, appearing in 196 postings.

### Firefighting



Among the traditional employers like city, county, and other government agencies, National Testing Network shows up as the entity with the most number of job postings. They act as a placement agency for firefighters and other public safety occupations, providing testing and other screening services for employers.

Firefighting occupations are described by a variety of job titles in job postings, including wildland firefighter and airport firefighter. These two common job titles may indicate airports and government agencies are the leading employers for these jobs.


### Exhibit 12. Top job titles in job postings

In Los Angeles County, the employers who posted the most advertisements for firefighting job vacancies were a federal government agency and a statewide public safety agency. The city and county of Los Angeles were among the top 10 employers in job postings.

Top skills requested in job postings were fire protection and suppression. In addition to firefighting and first aid skills, employers also are looking for candidates with budgeting, scheduling, and network testing skills.

### **Education & Training Supply Analysis**

In Los Angeles County, 11 community colleges and 2 proprietary schools offer programs related to firefighting. In the 2019-20 academic year, community colleges conferred 598 awards and proprietary schools conferred 45 awards.

### **Employment Demand Analysis**

Five middle-skill occupations account for 5,729 jobs in specialized public safety occupations which combined have 615 projected annual openings. The largest occupation is transportation security screeners. This occupation also is projected to have the most job openings, 243, followed by information security analysts, 208.

A search of online job postings shows 4,262 postings related to specialized public safety occupations in 2020 in Los Angeles County. Nearly all advertisements (96%) were for information security analysts.

### **Specialized Public Safety Occupations**

## **Ø** Job Posting Finding

Because information security analysts account for 96% of the occupations listed in job postings, the analysis took a closer look at hiring requirements for this career. Top requested specialized skills are Microsoft Office, Linux, Python, JavaScript, and vulnerability assessment. Top certifications in job postings are SANS/GIAC (Global Information Assurance Certification), Cisco, and CompTIA Security+.

Since information security analysts dominated the job postings, the job titles below are likely directly related to this occupation as all allude to security or information security. Among the top 10 job titles were cloud engineer and cyber security engineer (28 and 26 job postings, respectively).


In Los Angeles County, employers with job postings related to specialized public safety represent many different industries, including healthcare, finance, aerospace manufacturing, and entertainment.

In Los Angeles County, 7 community colleges and 5 proprietary schools offer programs related to other specialized public safety occupations. In the 2019-20 academic year, community colleges conferred 93 awards and proprietary schools conferred 91 awards related to this field.

Several area colleges provide programs that prepare students to enter specialized public safety occupations:
