GLOBAL TRADE SECTOR PROFILE









Introduction

To support the collaborative planning and development of career education (CE) programs and to inform regional investments in Los Angeles County, the Los Angeles County Center of Excellence has developed a series of sector profiles examining trends in the labor market and postsecondary education and training programs addressing local hiring needs.¹

These profiles highlight in-demand and well-paid middle-skill jobs—those jobs that typically require some form of education or training beyond a high school diploma, but less than a bachelor's degree. These occupations are a critical component of the workforce overall and support the economic vitality of the region and state.

This profile of the global trade sector summarizes key findings on current and projected workforce demand, hourly wages, job postings, and program and training data from area community colleges and other training providers.



¹ Impact of the COVID-19 pandemic: This profile relies largely on 2019 employment and education data preceding the pandemic. The exception is job posting data from 2020. Due to severe economic impacts from the pandemic, job posting data should not be considered an accurate depiction of employer demand; however, the frequency of certain data points can provide insights into the types of workers and skill sets that employers are seeking. Annual job openings are derived from the labor market analytics firm Emsi whose projections are modeled on recorded (historical) employment figures and incorporate several underlying assumptions, including the assumption that the economy during the projection period will be at approximately full employment or potential output. At this time, it is not possible to quantify the economic impact of COVID-19 on projections of occupational employment. A complete list of data sources is provided on the last page of this profile.

Student Employment Outcomes

Data on community college students exiting global trade programs in Los Angeles County shows growth in those who obtained employment in a job closely related to their field of study followed by a significant decrease, from 76% in the 2015-16 academic year to 63% in 2016-17. On average, these students earned a median income of \$32,864 after exiting a global trade program.

Exhibit 1. Students with a job closely related to their field of study





Exhibit 2. Median annual earnings for exiting students, 2017-18






Employment Demand Analysis

Five global trade occupations account for 198,374 jobs in Los Angeles County. Combined they have 16,593 projected annual openings (new + replacement jobs). The largest occupation, in number of 2019 jobs, is general and operations managers. This occupation is projected to have the most annual job openings, 5,393.

式 Job Posting Finding

Two types of career areas dominate the top global trade job titles—sales and management. Common sales titles include inside sales representative, sales consultant, e-commerce specialist, and retail sales specialist. Common management titles include general manager, operations assistant manager, operations supervisor, and e-commerce manager.

A search of online job postings shows 51,209 postings related to this group of occupations in 2020 in Los Angeles County. The top five job titles for global trade occupations were listed in 6,486 postings. The job title that occurred most frequently, sales representative, appeared in more than 2,000 postings.

In Los Angeles County, employers who posted the most ads for global trade occupations were Anthem Blue Cross, Charter Communications, and Amazon.


Local area job postings show how employers of the global trade occupations are grouped by industry. In Los Angeles County, direct health and medical insurance carriers posted the most job ads, a total of 1,425, followed by software publishers, 492 job ads, and direct life insurance carriers, 446 job ads.

One way to determine how in-demand skills coalesce across occupations and industries is to look at skill clusters which can offer a broader picture of employer needs. Two of the top five skill clusters in demand for global trade occupations are related to general sales practices, and two other skill clusters emphasize the importance of customer service and managing client relationships.

Education & Training Supply Analysis

In Los Angeles County, nine community colleges and five proprietary schools and other training providers offer programs related to the global trade occupations. In the 2019-20 academic year, community colleges conferred 75 awards, and in the 2018-19 academic year, proprietary schools and other training providers conferred 71 awards.

Regional Assets And Training Programs



Promising Career Areas

As an international trade gateway for California and the western United States, Los Angeles County supports a robust and thriving global trade sector. The county's three major global trade employers are the Los Angeles World Airports and Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach. Employment demand is tied to several areas—customs, imports and exports, global logistics, and e-commerce activity in the region.

The global trade sector has significant crossover with the business and entrepreneurship sector, and these jobs are known to contribute to the economic vitality of the region. There are many occupations within the business and entrepreneurship sector that overlap with the global trade sector. Examples include:

- Cargo and Freight Agents (SOC 43-5011)
- Brokerage Clerks (SOC 43-4011)
- Buyers and Purchasing Agents, Farm Products (SOC 13-1021)
- Transportation, Storage, and Distribution Managers (SOC 11-3071)
- Logisticians (SOC 13-1081)



Additional Programs Providing Training

Although only one TOP code is assigned to the global trade sector, many programs within the business and entrepreneurship sector and the advanced transportation and logistics sector also can prepare students to enter global trade occupations. Examples of related programs include:

Key Community College Projects & Partnerships

- Hosted by Long Beach City College, the California International Trade Center (CITC) leverages digital services
 and tools to empower small- and medium-sized businesses to grow sales in overseas markets and engages
 companies locally to optimize their e-commerce strategies domestically and globally, which is particularity
 relevant given the accelerated shift to e-commerce for businesses during the pandemic. The CITC works with
 colleges through its Global Virtual Internship Program where students along with their digital marketing
 mentor work with real life clients in areas of global website optimization, social media, and adversity strategy.
- The Port of Long Beach Maritime Center of Excellence at Long Beach City College is a regional asset supported
 by the global trade sector and advanced transportation and logistics sector as an example of short-term
 training that can be offered in both sectors. The center offers a variety of programs for middle-skill supply
 chain and logistics occupations.
- A cross-sector collaboration among business and entrepreneurship, advanced transportation and logistics, and global trade, the Digital Badge program through the Proven Ready initiative offers students the opportunity to learn critical skills, explore career paths, and earn digital credentials to display on their LinkedIn profiles or other online portfolios. Through the digital badging platform NexusEdge, participants can connect with 28 companies that have provided 80 skills-based training and exam modules that allow students to explore careers and earn industry-created and employer-desired skill sets.
