


# **Dance Instructor Occupations**

Labor Market Analysis: San Diego County

December 2021

#### Summary



This brief provides labor market information about *Dance Instructor Occupations* to assist the San Diego and Imperial Counties Community Colleges with program development and strategic planning. *Dance Instructor Occupations* include "Choreographers," "Dancers," and "Self-Enrichment Teachers." According to available labor market information, *Dance Instructor Occupations* in San Diego County have a labor market demand of 940 annual job openings (while average demand for a single occupation in San Diego County is 242 annual job openings), and nine institutions supply 234 awards for these occupations, suggesting that there is a supply gap in the labor market. Entry-level wages are below the living wage and median wages are above the living wage for all occupations. This brief recommends proceeding with caution when developing a new program but supports a program modification because entry-level wages are below the living wage while 1) a high number of annual job openings exist and 2) a supply gap exists for these occupations. The college should note that the percentage of students who obtained a living wage after completing a related program is **below** the state average for students who complete Career Education programs in general.

#### Introduction

This report provides labor market information in San Diego County for the following occupational codes in the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC)<sup>1</sup> system:

- Choreographers (SOC 27-2032): Create new dance routines. Rehearse performance of routines.
   May direct and stage presentations.
- Dancers (SOC 27-2031): Perform dances. May perform on stage, for broadcasting, or for video recording.
- Self-Enrichment Teachers (SOC 25-3021): Teach or instruct individuals or groups for the primary purpose of self-enrichment or recreation, rather than for an occupational objective, educational attainment, competition, or fitness.

For the purpose of this report, these occupations are referred to as Dance Instructor Occupations.

#### **Projected Occupational Demand**

Between 2020 and 2025, Dance Instructor Occupations are projected to increase by 847 net jobs or 13 percent (Exhibit 1a). Employers in San Diego County will need to hire 940 workers annually to fill new jobs and backfill jobs due to attrition caused by turnover and retirement, for example.




Exhibit 1a: Number of Jobs for Dance Instructor Occupations (2010-2025)<sup>2</sup>

Exhibit 1b disaggregates the projected number of jobs change by occupation. "Self-Enrichment Teachers" are projected to have the most labor market demand between 2020 and 2025, with 908 annual job openings.

## **Earnings**

Exhibit 2a disaggregates hourly earnings by occupation. The entry-level hourly earnings for *Dance Instructor Occupations* range from \$12.30 to \$15.17.

On average, the entry-level hourly earnings for *Dance Instructor Occupations* are \$13.39; this is less than the living wage for a single adult in San Diego County, which is \$18.43 per hour (Exhibit 2b).<sup>5</sup>

### **Educational Supply**

Educational supply for an occupation can be estimated by analyzing the number of awards in related Taxonomy of Programs (TOP) or Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) codes.<sup>8</sup> There are four TOP codes and seven CIP codes related to *Dance Instructor Occupations* (Exhibit 3).

According to TOP data, six community colleges supply the region with awards for these occupations:

Grossmont College, MiraCosta College, Palomar College, San Diego City College, San Diego Mesa

College, and Southwestern College. According to CIP data, three non-community-college institutions supply the region with awards: San Diego State University, University of California-San Diego, and University of San Diego (Exhibit 4).

#### **Demand vs. Supply**

Comparing labor demand (annual openings) with labor supply  $^{10}$  suggests that there is a supply gap for these occupations in San Diego County, with 940 annual openings and 234 awards. Comparatively, there are 7,757 annual openings in California and 2,806 awards, suggesting that there is a supply gap across the state  $^{11}$  (Exhibit 5).

**Please note:** This is a basic analysis of supply and demand of labor. The data does not include workers currently in the labor force who could fill these positions or workers who are not captured by publicly available data. This data should be used to discuss the potential gaps or oversupply of workers; however, it should not be the only basis for determining whether or not a program should be developed.



### **Student Outcomes and Regional Comparisons**

According to the California Community Colleges LaunchBoard, 33 percent of students in the San Diego-Imperial region earned a living wage after completing a program related to *Dance Instructor Occupations*, compared to 24 to 32 percent statewide and 55 percent of students in Career Education programs in general across the state (Exhibit 6a).<sup>12</sup>

Exhibit 6a: Percentage of Students Who Earned a Living Wage by Program, PY2018-1913





According to the California Community Colleges LaunchBoard, 60 percent of students in the San Diego-Imperial region obtained a job closely related to their field of study after completing a program related to Dance Instructor Occupations, compared to 54 to 75 percent statewide and 72 percent of students in Career Education programs in general across the state (Exhibit 6b).<sup>14</sup>

### **Online Job Postings**

This report analyzes not only historical and projected (traditional LMI) data, but also recent data from online job postings (real-time LMI). Online job postings may provide additional insight about recent changes in the labor market that are not captured by historical data. Between 2010 and 2020, there was an average of 248 online job postings per year for *Dance Instructor Occupations* in San Diego County (Exhibit 7). Please note that online job postings do **not** equal labor market demand; demand is represented by annual job openings (see Exhibit 1b). Employers may post a position multiple times for various reasons, such as increasing the pool of applicants, for example.




Exhibit 7: Number of Online Job Postings for Dance Instructor Occupations in San Diego County (2010-2020)<sup>16</sup>

### **Top Employers**

Between January 1, 2018 and December 31, 2020, the top five employers in San Diego County for *Dance Instructor Occupations* were Fit Kids America, YMCA, Atria Senior Living, Traveling Music Lessons, and Coastal Music Studios based on online job postings (Exhibit 8).

#### **Education, Skills, and Certifications**


Dance Instructor Occupations have a national educational attainment ranging from no formal educational credential to a high school diploma or equivalent (Exhibit 9a).

Based on online job postings between January 1, 2018 and December 31, 2020 in San Diego County, employers posted a bachelor's degree as the educational requirement for *Dance Instructor Occupations* (Exhibit 9b).<sup>19</sup>
