

Program Endorsement Brief: 2105.30/ Industrial and Transportation Security Emergency Management

The Orange County Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (COE) prepared this report to provide Los Angeles/Orange County regional labor market supply and demand data related to one middle-skill occupation: security guards (33-9032). Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree. The above middle-skill occupation emergency management directors (11-9161) is also included because it aligns with the skills and subject matter knowledge that students can attain through completion of the proposed program. This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with the relevant occupations.

Based on the available data there appears to be a supply gap for the middle-skill occupation security guards in the region. Furthermore, while this occupation typically requires a high school diploma, more than one-third of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education. However, entry-level wages are lower than the living wage in both Los Angeles and Orange counties and the current California minimum wage (\$14.00/hour for employers with 25 employers or less; \$15.00/hour for employers with 26 or more employees). Therefore, due to some of the criteria being met, the COE endorses this proposed program. Detailed reasons include:

Demand:

Supply Gap Criteria – Over the next five years, there is projected to be 9,260 middle-skill jobs available annually in the region due to new job growth and replacements which is more than the 137 awards conferred annually by educational institutions in the region.

¹ The COE classifies middle-skill jobs as the following:

[•] All occupations that require an educational requirement of some college, associate degree or apprenticeship;

[•] All occupations that require a bachelor's degree, but also have more than one-third of their existing labor force with an educational attainment of some college or associate degree; or

All occupations that require a high school diploma or equivalent or no formal education, but also require short- to longterm on-the-job training where multiple community colleges have existing programs.

- Living Wage Criteria Within Orange County, typical entry-level hourly wages for the middle-skill occupation security guards are \$13.99, which is lower than the living wage for one adult in the region (\$20.63 in Orange County)² and the current California minimum wage (\$14.00/hour for employers with 25 employers or less; \$15.00/hour for employers with 26 or more employees).
- Educational Criteria The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a high school diploma or equivalent as the typical entry-level education for security guards.
 - However, the national-level educational attainment data indicates between
 41.3% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education.

Supply:

- There are six community colleges in the LA/OC region that issue awards related to Emergency Management, conferring an average of 76 awards annually between 2017 and 2020.
- Between 2016 and 2019, there was an average of 212 awards conferred annually
 in related training programs by non-community college institutions, all of which were
 generated by eight non-community college institutions throughout the region.

Occupational Demand

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for the middle skill occupation security guards. In Los Angeles/Orange County, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to increase by 1% through 2025. There will be more than 9,200 job openings per year through 2025 due to job growth and replacements.

Wages

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for the middle-skill occupation security guards in Orange County as they relate to the county's living wage. Los Angeles County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the LA/OC region. Detailed wage information, by county, is included in Appendix A.

³ Five-year change represents new job additions to the workforce. Annual openings include new jobs and replacement jobs that result from retirements and separations.

Orange County: The typical entry-level hourly wages for the middle skill occupation security guards are \$13.99, which is below the living wage for one adult (\$20.63 in Orange County) and California's current minimum wage (\$14.00/hour for employers with 25 employers or less; \$15.00/hour for employers with 26 or more employees). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages of \$17.68, which is lower than the living wage estimate. Orange County's average wages are below the average statewide wage of \$17.40 for this occupation.

The typical entry-level hourly wages for the above middle-skill occupations emergency management directors are \$37.33, which is above the living wage for one adult (\$20.63 in Orange County). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages of \$63.14, which is higher than the living wage estimate. Orange County's average wages are below the average statewide wage of \$55.75 for this occupation.

Los Angeles County: The typical entry-level hourly wages for the middle-skill occupation security guards are \$13.96, which is below the living wage for one adult (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County) and California's current minimum wage (\$14.00/hour for employers with 25 employers or less; \$15.00/hour for employers with 26 or more employees). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages of \$17.64, which is lower than the living wage estimate. Los Angeles County's average wages are below the average statewide wage of \$17.40 for this occupation.

The typical entry-level hourly wages for the above middle-skill occupation emergency management directors are \$41.46, which is above the living wage for one adult (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages of \$66.00, which is higher than the living wage estimate. Los Angeles County's average wages are above the average statewide wage of \$55.75 for this occupation.

Job Postings

There were 28,705 online job postings related to the middle-skill occupation security guards listed in the past 12 months. The highest number of job postings were for security officers, security guards, unarmed security officers, and armed security officers. The top skills were handling of crisis or emergency situations, customer service, law enforcement or criminal justice experience, cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), and security experience. The top three employers, by number of job postings, in the region were Allied Universal, Securitas, and GardaWorld Security Services US.

There were 312 online job postings related to the above middle-skill occupation emergency management directors listed in the past 12 months. The highest number of job postings were for emergency management specialists, response professionals, and nurse directors of emergency services. The top skills were customer service, scheduling, project management, and emergency services. The top three employers, by number of job postings, in the region were The Boeing Company, the University of California, and American Red Cross.

Educational Attainment

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a high school diploma as the typical entry-level education for the middle-skill occupation security guards. However, the national-level educational attainment

data indicates 41.3% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education. Of the 79% of security guard job postings listing a minimum education requirement in Los Angeles/Orange County, 98.2% (22,481) requested high school or vocational training, 0.2% (50) requested an associate degree, and 1.4% (330) requested a bachelor's degree.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a bachelor's degree as the typical entry-level education for the above middle-skill occupation emergency management directors. Furthermore, the national-level educational attainment data indicates 24.3% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education. Of the 60% of emergency management director job postings listing a minimum education requirement in Los Angeles/Orange County, 14.4% (27) requested an associate degree, 78.1% (146) requested a bachelor's degree, and 7.5% (14) requested a master's or doctoral degree.

Educational Supply

Community College Supply—Exhibit 2 shows the three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in the related TOP codes: Industrial and Transportation Security (2105.30) and Other Public and Protective Services (2199.00). The college with the most completions in the region is East LA. None of the awards conferred by these colleges were noncredit awards. Over the past 12 months, there was one other related program recommendation request from regional community colleges.

Non-Community College Supply—For a comprehensive regional supply analysis, it is also important to consider the supply from other institutions in the region that provide training programs for Emergency Management. Exhibit 3 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by these institutions in the related Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) Codes: Security and Loss Prevention Services (43.0109) and Homeland Security

(43.0301). Due to different data collection periods, the most recent three-year period of available data is from 2016 to 2019. Between 2016 and 2019, four-year colleges in the region conferred an average of 212 awards annually in related training programs.
