The Los Angeles/Orange County Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (COE) prepared this report to provide Los Angeles/Orange County regional labor market supply and demand data related to two middle-skill occupations: social and human service assistants (21-1093), and community health workers (21-1094). Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree.¹ This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with the relevant occupations.

Based on the available data, there appears to be a supply gap for these middle-skill community and social service occupations in the region. Furthermore, many current workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree, and entry-level wages exceed the living wage in Los Angeles County. **Therefore**, **due to all the criteria being met**, **the COE endorses this proposed program.** Detailed reasons include:

Demand:

- Supply Gap Criteria Over the next five years, there is projected to be 3,595 jobs available annually in the region due to new job growth and replacements, which is more than the 975 awards conferred annually by educational institutions in the region.
- Living Wage Criteria Within Los Angeles County, all of the annual job openings for these middle-skill community and social service occupations have entry-level wages above the county's living wage (\$15.04/hour).²

[•] All occupations that require an educational requirement of some college, associate degree or apprenticeship;

[•] All occupations that require a bachelor's degree, but also have more than one-third of their existing labor force with an educational attainment of some college or associate degree; or

[•] All occupations that require a high school diploma or equivalent or no formal education, but also require short- to long-term on-the-job training where multiple community colleges have existing programs.

- Educational Criteria The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a high school diploma as the typical entry-level education for these middle-skill community and social service occupations.
 - While the national-level educational attainment data indicates between 24.1% and 32.6% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree, the occupation with the majority of regional annual openings (social and human service assistants) has at least 32% of workers in in the field who have completed some college or an associate degree.

Supply:

- There are **9 community colleges** in the LA/OC region that issue awards related to community health/and or human services, conferring an average of **183 awards annually** between 2016 and 2019.
- Between 2014 and 2017, there was an average of **792 awards conferred annually** in related training programs by non-community college institutions throughout the region.

Occupational Demand

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for middle-skill community and social service occupations. In Los Angeles/Orange County, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to increase by 14% through 2024. There will be nearly 3,600 job openings per year through 2024 due to job growth and replacements.

This report includes employment projection data by Emsi, which uses EDD information. Emsi's projections are modeled on recorded (historical) employment figures and incorporate several underlying assumptions, including the assumption that the economy, during the projection period, will be at approximately full employment. To the extent that a recession or labor shock, such as the economic effects of COVID-19, can cause long-term structural change, it may impact the projections. At this time, it is not possible to quantify the impact of COVID-19 on projections of industry and occupational employment. Therefore, the projections included in this report do not take the impacts of COVID-19 into account.

Wages

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for these middle-skill community and social service occupations in Los Angeles County as they relate to the county's living wage. Orange County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the LA/OC region. Detailed wage information, by county, is included in Appendix A.

Los Angeles County— All of the annual openings for middle-skill community and social service occupations have entry-level wages above the living wage for one adult (\$15.04 in Los Angeles County). Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$16.24 and \$17.24. Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$23.80 and \$26.60, which are higher than the living wage estimate. Los Angeles County's average wages are below the average statewide wage of \$21.51 for these occupations.

Orange County— All of the annual openings for middle-skill community and social service occupations have entry-level wages below the living wage for one adult (\$17.36 in Los Angeles County).⁴ Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$15.57 and \$16.48. Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$22.91 and \$25.49, which are higher than the living wage estimate. Orange County's average wages are below the average statewide wage of \$21.51 for these occupations.

Job Postings

There were 1,507 online job postings related to middle-skill community and social service occupations listed in the past 12 months. The highest number of job postings were for outreach specialists, care coordinators, social services assistants, contact tracers, and community liaisons. The top skills were case management, customer service, social services, mental health, and data entry. The top three employers, by number of job postings, in the region were Volunteers of America, Los Angeles LGBT Center, and Anthem Blue Cross.

It is important to note that the job postings data included in this section reflects online job postings listed in the past 12 months and does not yet demonstrate the impact of COVID-19. While employers have generally posted fewer online job postings since the beginning of the pandemic, the long-term effects are currently unknown.

Educational Attainment

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a high school diploma as the typical entry-level education for both of these middle-skill community and social service occupations. While the national-level educational attainment data indicates between 24.1% and 32.6% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree, the occupation with the majority of regional annual openings (social and human service assistants) has at least 32% of workers in in the field who have completed some college or an associate degree. Of the 73% of middle-skill community and social service job postings listing a minimum education requirement in Los Angeles/Orange County, 51% (562) requested a high school diploma, 42% (460) requested a bachelor's degree and 7% (77) requested an associate degree.

Educational Supply

Community College Supply—Exhibit 2 shows the three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in the related TOP codes: Community Health Care Worker (1261.00) and Human Services (2104.00). The colleges with the most completions in the region are Santa Ana, Long Beach, and Cypress. Over the past 12 months, there were two other related program recommendation requests from regional community colleges.

Non-Community College Supply—For a comprehensive regional supply analysis, it is also important to consider the supply from other institutions in the region that provide training programs for middle-skill community and social service occupations. Exhibit 3 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by these institutions in the related Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) Code: Human Services, General (44.000). Due to different data collection periods, the most recent three-year period of available data is from 2014 to 2017. Between 2014 and 2017, four-year colleges in the region conferred an average of 792 awards annually in related training programs.
