

# TEACHER/EDUCATION OCCUPATIONS

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June 2022  
San Diego County



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## Summary and Findings

Education encompasses a wide range of disciplines and career pathways, including early care and education, preschool and childcare programs, elementary and secondary education, special education, and educational administration. This report includes labor market information for *Teacher/Education Occupations* in San Diego County to assist the community college system with program development and strategic planning. Due to the complexity in this industry, the San Diego-Imperial COE analyzed traditional labor market information (LMI) for *Teacher/Education Occupations* and online job postings (real-time LMI) for the subset, *Special Education Occupations*, and grouped all occupations into five categories for this study: 1) Preschool/Childcare; 2) Primary School; 3) Secondary School; 4) Postsecondary Education; and 5) Other Education. Based on the available LMI, the San Diego-Imperial COE found that:

- There is a labor market supply gap for *Teacher/Education Occupations* in San Diego County.
- Entry-level and median wages for *Teacher/Education Occupations* are above the living wage for San Diego County (except the entry-level wages of Preschool Teachers, Except Special Education; Childcare Workers; and Career/Technical Education Teachers, Middle School). This suggests that with enough education and experience, workers in these positions could earn sustainable wages.
- Employers posted a minimum of a bachelor's degree for *Teacher/Education Occupations*.
- There are 11 Taxonomy of Programs (TOP) codes and 26 Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) codes that currently exist, related to *Teacher/Education Occupations* in San Diego County.

## Introduction

To assess the regional impact of the statewide education labor shortage, the San Diego-Imperial Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (COE) analyzed five levels of *Teacher/Education Occupations*: 1) Preschool/Childcare; 2) Primary School; 3) Secondary School; 4) Postsecondary Education; and 5) Other Education.<sup>1</sup> To complete this, the San Diego-Imperial COE examined **traditional**<sup>2</sup> labor market information for the following occupational codes in the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC)<sup>3</sup> system and grouped them into these five categories.

Preschool/Childcare jobs include:

- [Childcare Workers](#) (SOC 39-9011): Attend to children at schools, businesses, private households, and childcare institutions. Perform a variety of tasks, such as dressing, feeding, bathing, and overseeing play.
- [Education and Childcare Administrators, Preschool and Daycare](#) (SOC 11-9031): Plan, direct, or coordinate academic or nonacademic activities of preschools or childcare centers and programs, including before- and after-school care.
- [Preschool Teachers, Except Special Education](#) (SOC 25-2011): Instruct preschool-aged students, following curricula or lesson plans, in activities designed to promote social, physical, and intellectual growth.
- [Special Education Teachers, Preschool](#) (SOC 25-2051): Teach academic, social, and life skills to preschool-aged students with learning, emotional, or physical disabilities. Includes teachers who specialize and work with students who are blind or have visual impairments; students who are deaf or have hearing impairments; and students with intellectual disabilities.

Primary school jobs include:

- [Career/Technical Education Teachers, Middle School](#) (SOC 25-2023): Teach occupational, vocational, career, or technical subjects to students at the middle, intermediate, or junior high school level.
- [Elementary School Teachers, Except Special Education](#) (SOC 25-2021): Teach academic and social skills to students at the elementary school level.

- [Kindergarten Teachers, Except Special Education](#) (SOC 25-2012): Teach academic and social skills to kindergarten students.
- [Middle School Teachers, Except Special and Career/Technical Education](#) (SOC 25-2022): Teach one or more subjects to students at the middle, intermediate, or junior high school level.
- [Special Education Teachers, Kindergarten and Elementary School](#) (SOC 25-2052): Teach academic, social, and life skills to kindergarten students with learning, emotional, or physical disabilities. Includes teachers who specialize and work with students who are blind or have visual impairments; students who are deaf or have hearing impairments; and students with intellectual disabilities.
- [Special Education Teachers, Middle School](#) (SOC 25-2057): Teach academic, social, and life skills to middle school students with learning, emotional, or physical disabilities. Includes teachers who specialize and work with students who are blind or have visual impairments; students who are deaf or have hearing impairments; and students with intellectual disabilities.

Secondary school jobs include:

- [Career/Technical Education Teachers, Secondary School](#) (SOC 25-2032): Teach occupational, vocational, career, or technical subjects to students at the secondary school level.
- [Secondary School Teachers, Except Special and Career/Technical Education](#) (SOC 25-2031): Teach one or more subjects to students at the secondary school level.
- [Special Education Teachers, Secondary School](#) (SOC 25-2058): Teach academic, social, and life skills to secondary school students with learning, emotional, or physical disabilities. Includes teachers who specialize and work with students who are blind or have visual impairments; students who are deaf or have hearing impairments; and students with intellectual disabilities.

Postsecondary education jobs include:

- [Education Administrators, Postsecondary](#) (SOC 11-9033): Plan, direct, or coordinate student instruction, administration, and services, as well as other research and educational activities, at postsecondary institutions, including universities, colleges, and junior and community colleges.
- [Postsecondary Teachers](#) (SOC 25-1099): Aggregate category equivalent to SOC group 25-1000. Teach undergraduate and graduate level courses in their specialized field of study. Include both teachers primarily engaged in teaching and those who do a combination of both teaching and research. Alternate titles: College Professor.
- [Teaching Assistants, Postsecondary](#) (SOC 25-9044): Assist faculty or other instructional staff in postsecondary institutions by performing instructional support activities, such as developing

teaching materials, leading discussion groups, preparing and giving examinations, and grading examinations or papers.

Other education jobs include:

- [Adult Basic Education, Adult Secondary Education, and English as a Second Language Instructors](#) (SOC 25-3011): Teach or instruct out-of-school youths and adults in basic education, literacy, or English as a Second Language classes, or in classes for earning a high school equivalency credential.
- [Education Administrators, Kindergarten through Secondary](#) (SOC 11-9032): Plan, direct, or coordinate the academic, administrative, or auxiliary activities of kindergarten, elementary, or secondary schools.
- [Self-Enrichment Teachers](#) (SOC 25-3021): Teach or instruct individuals or groups for the primary purpose of self-enrichment or recreation, rather than for an occupational objective, educational attainment, competition, or fitness.
- [Teaching Assistants, Except Postsecondary](#) (SOC 25-9045): Assist a preschool, elementary, middle, or secondary school teacher with instructional duties. Serve in a position for which a teacher has primary responsibility for the design and implementation of educational programs and services.
- [Tutors and Teachers and Instructors, All Other](#) (SOC 25-3097): Instruct individual students or small groups of students in academic subjects to support formal class instruction or to prepare students for standardized or admissions tests.

Collectively, these occupations are referred to as *Teacher/Education Occupations*. The following sections provide an overview of their labor market need, wages, program outcomes, and knowledge, skills and abilities.

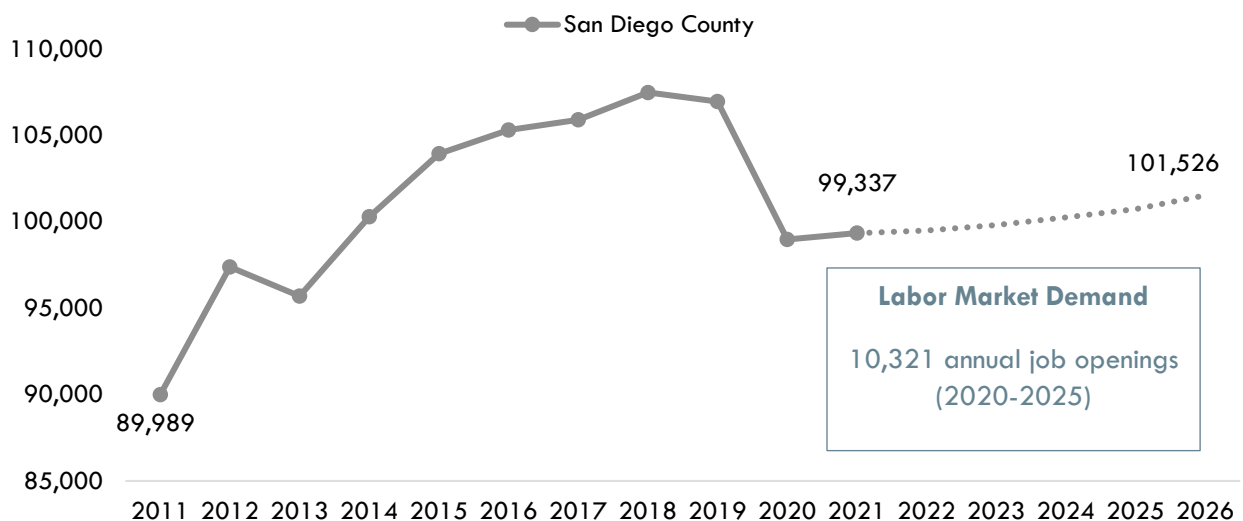
## Supply Gap Analysis

The following sections provide details on employer demand, educational supply, and supply gap analysis. A supply gap suggests that employers have more labor market demand than workers supplied by educational institutions.

### EMPLOYER DEMAND

Between 2021 and 2026, *Teacher/Education Occupations* are projected to increase by **2,189** net jobs or **two** percent (Exhibit 1). During this period, employers in San Diego County are projected to hire **10,321** workers annually to fill new jobs and backfill jobs due to attrition caused by turnover and retirement, for example.

Exhibit 2 provides more detailed information for each occupation, including projected employment change and labor market demand between 2021 and 2026. Labor market demand is defined by the number of job openings that employers expect to fill due to attrition (caused by turnover and retirement, for example). Employers in San Diego County are projected to hire **10,321** workers annually between 2021 and 2026 for *Teacher/Education Occupations*. “Postsecondary Teachers” are projected to have the most labor market demand between 2021 and 2026, with **2,135** annual job openings.

## EDUCATIONAL SUPPLY

Educational supply for an occupation can be estimated by analyzing the number of awards in related Taxonomy of Programs (TOP) or Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) codes.<sup>6</sup> Currently, there are 11 TOP codes and 26 CIP codes **with a program** related to *Teacher/Education Occupations* in San Diego County (Exhibit 3). For the full list of 14 TOP and 120 CIP codes, with or without a program related to *Teacher/Education Occupations*, refer to Appendix A.

According to CIP data, 11 non-community colleges supply the region with awards: Alliant International University-San Diego, Ashford University, California State University-San Marcos, National University, Northcentral University, Point Loma Nazarene University, San Diego Christian College, San Diego State University, United States University, University of California-San Diego, and University of San Diego (Exhibit 4). 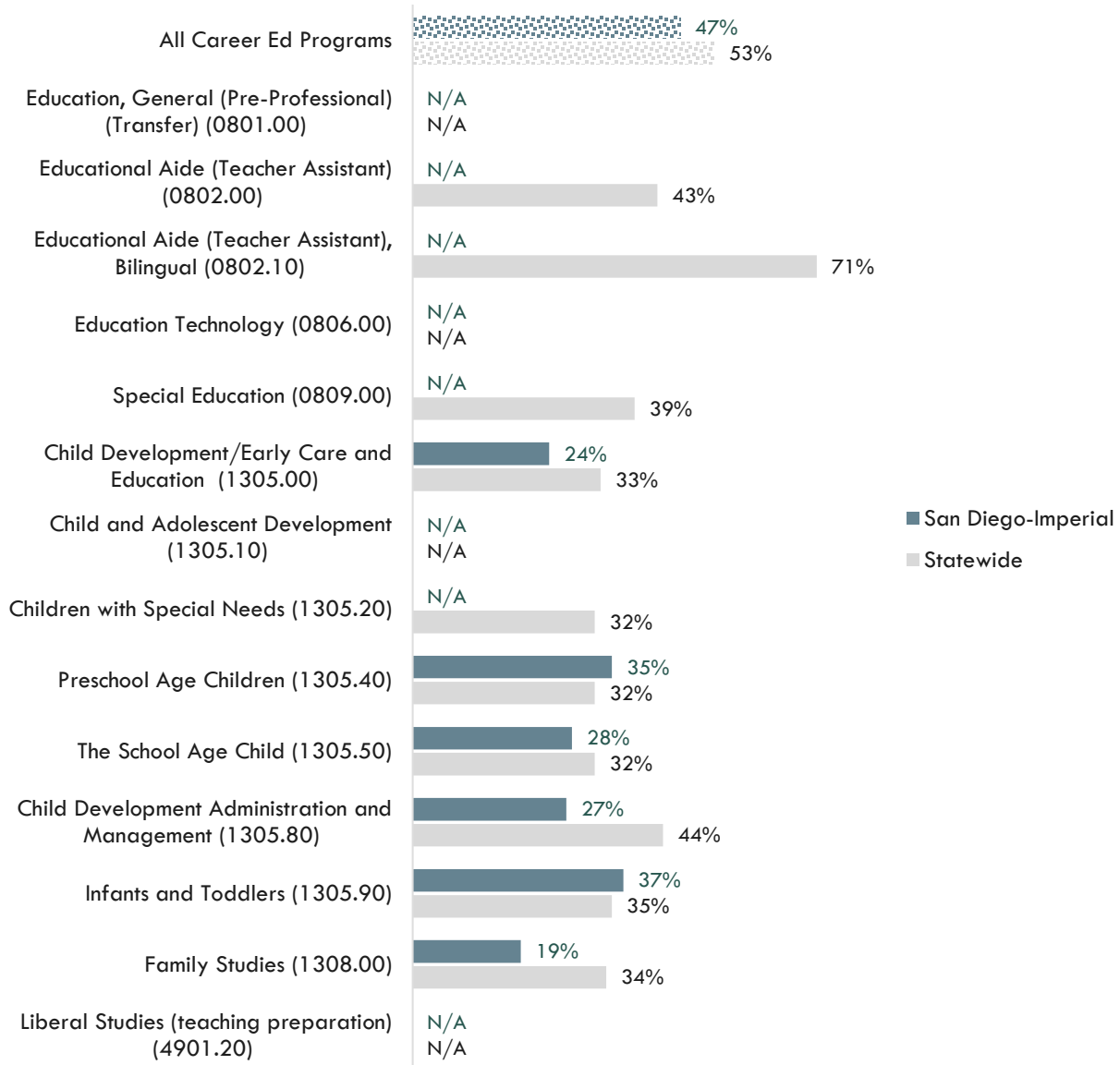

## STUDENT OUTCOMES

According to the California Community Colleges LaunchBoard, 19 to 37 percent of students in the San Diego-Imperial region earned a living wage after completing a program related *Teacher/Education Occupations*, compared to 32 to 71 percent statewide and 53 percent of students in Career Education programs in general across the state (Exhibit 5a).<sup>9</sup>

**Exhibit 5a: Percentage of Students Who Earned a Living Wage by Program (PY 2018-19)<sup>10</sup>**



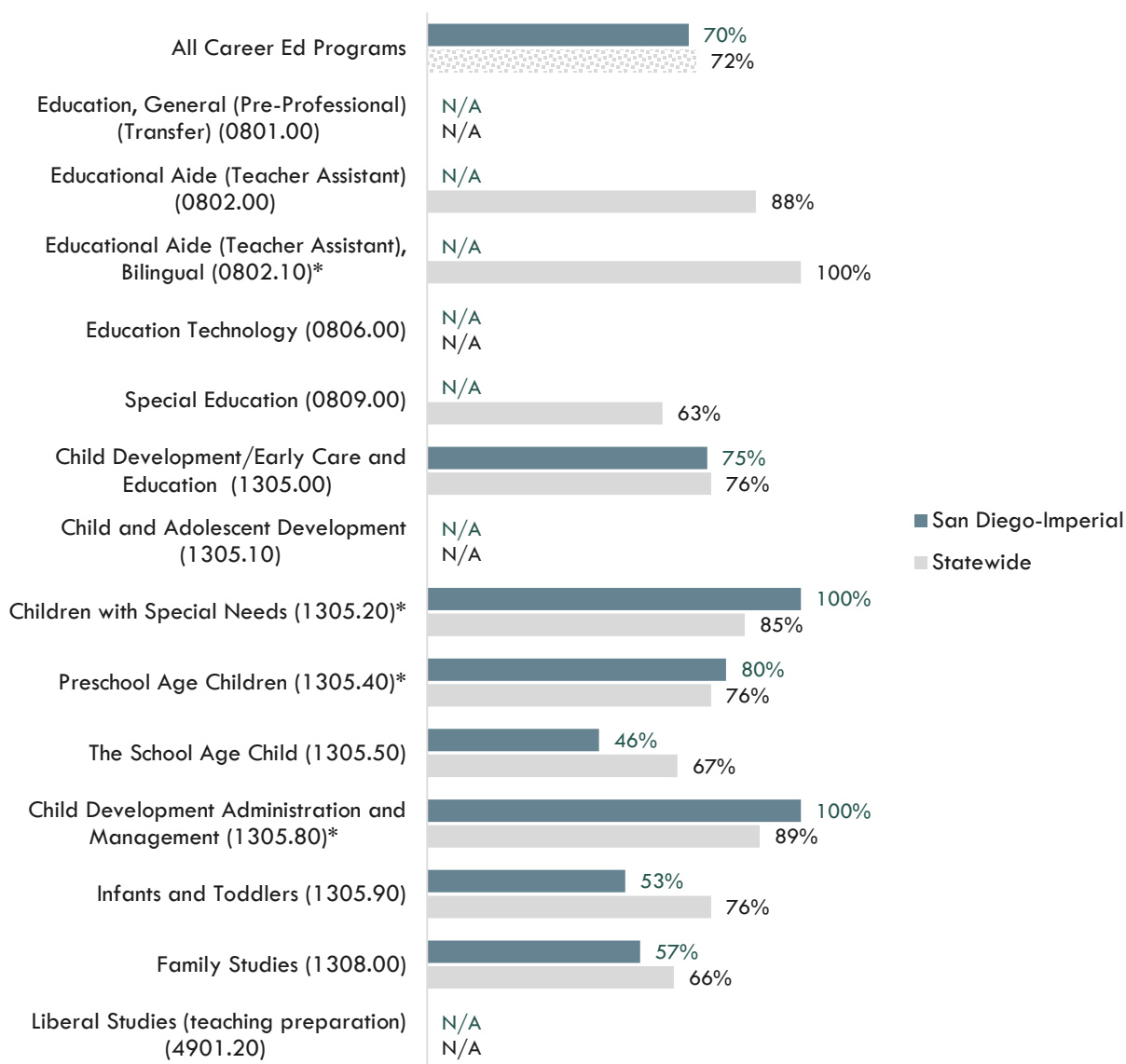

According to the California Community Colleges LaunchBoard, 46 to 100 percent of students statewide obtained a job closely related to their field of study after completing a program related to *Teacher/Education Occupations*, compared to 63 to 100 percent statewide and 72 percent of students in Career Education programs in general across the state (Exhibit 5b).<sup>11</sup>

## DEMAND VS. SUPPLY

Comparing labor demand (annual openings) with labor supply<sup>13</sup> suggests that there is a **supply gap** for these occupations in San Diego County, with **10,321** annual openings and **3,864** awards.

Comparatively, there are **119,462** annual openings in California and **42,254** awards, suggesting that there is also a supply gap across the state (Exhibit 6).

The data does not include workers currently in the labor force who could fill these positions or workers who are not captured by publicly available data. This data should be used to discuss the potential gaps or oversupply of workers; however, it should not be the only basis for determining whether a program should be developed.

## Occupational Overview

### TYPICAL ENTRY-LEVEL EDUCATION

Traditional labor market information indicates that more than 80 percent of *Teacher/Education Occupations* require a [bachelor's degree or higher](#) (Exhibit 7).

## WAGES

According to traditional LMI, entry-level hourly earnings for *Teacher/Education Occupations* range from **\$13.00** to **\$53.31** (Exhibit 8). All occupations except “Preschool Teachers, Except Special Education,” “Childcare Workers,” and “Career/Technical Education Teachers, Middle School,” earn more than the living wage for a single adult in San Diego County, which is \$18.43 per hour.<sup>15</sup>

## TOP EMPLOYERS

Exhibits 11a through 11e list the top 10 employers between January 1, 2019 and December 31, 2021, in San Diego County for *Teacher/Education Occupations*. For “Preschool/Childcare,” for example, the top five employers were [KinderCare](#), [Sitter](#), [Easterseals Southern California](#), [YMCA](#), and [Learning Care](#) based on online job postings (Exhibit 11a). There are currently 550 primary schools,<sup>25</sup> 147 secondary schools,<sup>26</sup> and 58 postsecondary institutions<sup>27</sup> in San Diego County that offer an associate or bachelor’s degree program for *Teacher/Education Occupations*. Nine of those postsecondary institutions are community colleges and 49 are other institutions.

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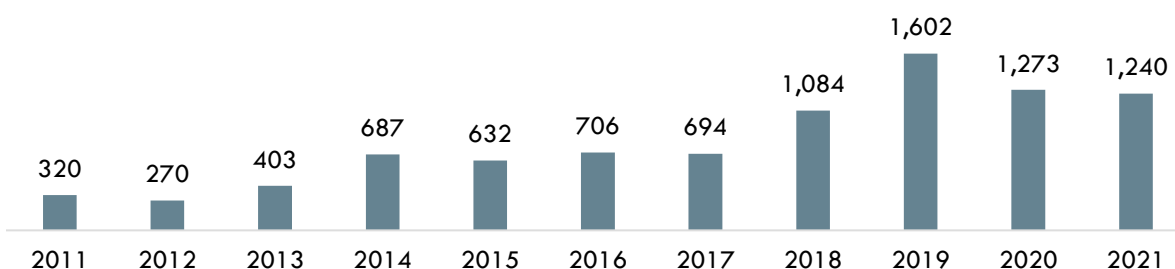

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION AND CERTIFIED POSITIONS

In addition to providing real-time LMI for *Teacher/Education Occupations*, this study also analyzes online job postings for special education and certified vs. non-certified positions. Between 2011 and 2021, there was an average of 810 online job postings per year for *Teacher/Education Occupations* in special education (*Special Education Teachers, All Other, Special Education Teachers, Kindergarten and Elementary School, Special Education Teachers, Middle School, Special Education Teachers, Preschool, and Special Education Teachers, Secondary School*) in San Diego County (Exhibit 12). Please note that online job postings do **not** equal labor market demand; demand is represented by annual job openings (see Exhibit 2). Employers may post a position multiple times for various reasons, such as increasing the pool of applicants, for example.

While online job postings provide insight on employers' need for *Teacher/Education Occupations* in special education, there was insufficient data to determine differences between certified and non-certified *Teacher/Education Occupations* in postsecondary education. In other words, while the San Diego-Imperial COE attempted to compare salaries for certified vs. non-certified *Teacher/Education Occupations* in postsecondary education, there was insufficient data because non-certified positions comprised only one percent of postings (147 out of 14,838).
