The Los Angeles County Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (LA COE) prepared this report to provide Los Angeles/Orange County regional labor market supply and demand data related to four middle-skill occupations:

- *Paralegals and legal assistants (23-2011);*
- *Title examiners, abstractors, and searchers (23-2093);*
- *Court reporters and simultaneous captioners (27-3092); and*
- *Legal secretaries and administrative assistants (43-6012).*

Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor’s degree.¹ This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with the relevant occupations.

Based on the available data, there appears to be a supply gap for these four occupations in the region. In addition to the majority of annual openings having entry-level wages that exceed the self-sufficiency standard wage in Los Angeles County, national-level educational attainment data indicates between 39% and 70% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree. **Therefore, due to all of the criteria being met, the COE endorses this proposed program.** Detailed reasons include:

¹ The COE classifies middle-skill jobs as the following:

- All occupations that require an educational requirement of some college, associate degree or apprenticeship;
- All occupations that require a bachelor’s degree, but also have more than one-third of their existing labor force with an educational attainment of some college or associate degree; or
- All occupations that require a high school diploma or equivalent or no formal education, but also require short- to long-term on-the-job training where multiple community colleges have existing programs.

Demand:

- **Supply Gap Criteria** – Over the next five years, there is projected to be **3,730 jobs available annually** in the region due to retirements and workers leaving the field, **which is more than the 540 awards conferred annually** by educational institutions in the region.
- **Living Wage Criteria** – In Los Angeles County, the majority of annual openings (94%) have entry-level wages above the self-sufficiency standard hourly wage (\$18.10/hour).²
- **Educational Criteria** – The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a high school diploma or equivalent as the typical entry-level education for *title examiners, abstractors, and searchers* (23-2093), and *legal secretaries and administrative assistants* (43-6012); a postsecondary nondegree award for *court reporters and simultaneous captioners* (27-3092); and an associate degree for *paralegals and legal assistants* (23-2011).
 - National-level educational attainment data indicates **between 39% and 70% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree.**

Supply:

- Between 2017 and 2020, **19 community colleges** in the LA/OC region offered programs that have historically trained for the four occupations of interest, conferring an average of **487 awards annually**.
- Between 2016 and 2019, there was an average of **53 awards conferred annually** in related training programs by non-community college institutions.

Occupational Demand

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for the four occupations of interest. In the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to increase by 1% through 2025. There will be 3,730 job openings per year through 2025 due to retirements and workers leaving the field.

This report includes employment projection data by Emsi, which uses EDD information. Emsi's projections are modeled on recorded (historical) employment figures and incorporate several underlying assumptions, including the assumption that the economy, during the projection period, will be at approximately full employment. To the extent that a recession or labor shock, such as the economic effects of COVID-19, can cause long-term structural change, it may impact the projections. At this time, it is not possible to quantify the impact of COVID-19 on projections of industry and occupational employment. Therefore, the projections included in this report do not take the impacts of COVID-19 into account.

Wages

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for these eDiscovery and litigation support occupations in Los Angeles County as they relate to the county’s self-sufficiency standard wage. Orange County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the LA/OC region. Detailed wage information, by county, is included in Appendix A.

Los Angeles County: The majority (94%) of annual job openings for these four occupations have entry-level wages **above** the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County). The only occupation with with entry-level hourly earnings below the self-sufficiency standard wage is *title examiners, abstractors, and searchers* (23-2093) at \$17.76. Typical entry-level hourly wages for the other three occupations are in a range between \$21.50 and \$26.90. Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$33.78 and \$49.25, which are higher than the self-sufficiency standard wage.

Orange County: Only 4% of annual job openings for these four occupations have entry-level wages **above** the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$20.63 in Orange County). The occupation with the highest entry-level wages is *court reporters and simultaneous captioners* (27-3092) at \$26.58. Typical entry-level hourly wages for the other three occupations are in a range between \$17.06 and \$19.46. Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$32.24 and \$48.77, which are higher than the self-sufficiency standard wage.

Job Postings

Over the past 12 months, there have been 11,952 online job postings related to the four occupations of interest in the greater LA/OC region. The highest number of job postings were for legal assistant, paralegal, litigation paralegal, and legal secretary. The top skills were litigation, legal documentation, and administrative support. The top employers, by number of job postings, in the region were APC, Disney, and First American Corporation.

It is important to note that the job postings data included in this section reflects online job postings listed in the past 12 months and does not yet demonstrate the impact of COVID-19. While employers

have generally posted fewer online job postings since the beginning of the pandemic, the long-term effects are currently unknown.

Educational Attainment

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a high school diploma or equivalent as the typical entry-level education for *title examiners, abstractors, and searchers* (23-2093), and *legal secretaries and administrative assistants* (43-6012); a postsecondary nondegree award for *court reporters and simultaneous captioners* (27-3092); and an associate degree for *paralegals and legal assistants* (23-2011).

National-level educational attainment data indicates between 39% and 70% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree. Of the 48% of job postings listing a minimum education requirement in Los Angeles/Orange County, 33% (1,916) requested a high school diploma, 11% (658) requested an associate degree, and 54% (3,098) requested a bachelor’s degree.

Educational Supply

Community College Supply — Exhibit 2 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in the related TOP codes: Legal Office Technology (0514.10); and Paralegal (1402.00). Between 2017 and 2020, community colleges in the region conferred an average of 487 awards annually in related training programs. The colleges with the most completions in the region are Coastline, Pasadena, and Cerritos.

Non-Community College Supply — It is important to consider the supply from non-community college institutions in the region that offer programs that train for the occupations of interest. Exhibit 3 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by these institutions in the related Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) Codes: 22.0301 – Legal Administrative Assistant/ Secretary; and 22.0302 – Legal Assistant/ Paralegal.

Due to different data collection periods, the most recent three-year period of available data is from 2016 to 2019. Between 2016 and 2019, non-community college institutions in the region conferred an average of 53 awards annually in related training programs.
