

Program Endorsement Brief: 3007.00/Cosmetology and Barbering Manicure Certificate (Noncredit)

The Orange County Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (COE) prepared this report to provide Los Angeles/Orange County regional labor market supply and demand data related to one middle-skill occupation: manicurists and pedicurists (39-5092). Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree. This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with the relevant occupations.

Based on the available data, there does not appear to be a supply gap for manicurists and pedicurists in the region. However, it is important to note that general cosmetology programs train for five other occupations that are not included in this report and the COE is unable to quantify the supply from general cosmetology programs for manicurists and pedicurists. Additionally, there were 1,582 awards conferred specifically for nail technicians and manicurists/pedicurists, suggesting that — at minimum — supply has been met for manicurists and pedicurists. While this occupation typically requires a postsecondary nondegree award, entry-level hourly earnings are significantly below the living wage in both Los Angeles and Orange counties. Experienced wages are also significantly below the living wage. Therefore, due to some of the criteria being met, the COE endorses this proposed program. Detailed reasons include:

Demand:

- Supply Gap Criteria Over the next five years, there is projected to be 1,759 jobs
 available annually in the region due to new job growth and replacements, which is less
 than the 3,869 awards conferred annually by educational institutions in the region.
 - However, 41% (1,582) of awards were conferred in programs specifically related to nail technicians and manicurists, suggesting that at minimum –

- **supply has been met for this occupation** because the average number of annual awards (supply) is within the COE's 25% margin of annual job openings (demand).
- Furthermore, the TOP Code Cosmetology and Barbering (3007.00) and CIP code Cosmetology/Cosmetologist, General (12.0401) train for five additional personal care occupations, including barbers (39-5011); hairdressers, hairstylists, and cosmetologists (39-5012); and skincare specialists (39-5094). Over the next five years, there are projected to be over 2,200 jobs related to these occupations available annually. Therefore, the supply for manicurists and pedicurists is overstated and the COE is unable to quantify the supply from general cosmetology programs that is solely for manicurists and pedicurists.
- Living Wage Criteria Within Orange County, typical entry-level hourly wages for manicurists and pedicurists are \$10.37, which is significantly lower than the living wage for one adult in the region (\$20.63 in Orange County).²
 - Furthermore, experienced hourly earnings are \$14.74, which is also significantly lower than the living wage.
- Educational Criteria The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a postsecondary nondegree award as the typical entry-level education for manicurists and pedicurists.
 - The national-level educational attainment data indicates 25% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education.
 - Additionally, manicurists and pedicurists must complete a course in nail care from a school approved by the Board of Barbering and Cosmetology in order to be eligible for the licensing examination.

Supply:

- Though general cosmetology programs prepare students for employment as manicurists and pedicurists, they also train for five other occupations that are not included in this report. Therefore, the COE is able to quantify supply for programs specifically related to manicurists and pedicurists, but is unable to quantify supply solely for manicurists and pedicurists from general cosmetology programs.
 - There are 11 community colleges in Los Angeles and Orange counties that issue awards related to cosmetology, conferring an average of 967 awards annually between 2017 and 2020.
 - O Between 2016 and 2019, there was an average of 2,902 awards conferred annually in related training programs by non-community college institutions, all of which were generated by 38 individual four-year colleges throughout the region. Of those, 55% (1,582) were specifically related to manicurists and pedicurist.

Occupational Demand

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for manicurists and pedicurists. In Los Angeles/Orange County, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to increase by 18% through 2025. There will be nearly 1,760 job openings per year through 2025 due to job growth and replacements.

Wages

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for manicurists and pedicurists in Orange County as they relate to the county's living wage. Los Angeles County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the LA/OC region. Detailed wage information, by county, is included in Appendix A.

It is important to note that over 50% of manicurists and pedicurists are considered self-employed. Self-employed workers have different earnings dynamics than wage and salaried workers, making direct comparisons difficult. Examples include deciphering what is a return to labor versus a return to capital, as well as showing possible negative earnings if expenses or investments exceed gross receipts.⁴ For these reasons, self-employed wage data appears to be significantly lower than both the living wage and minimum wage.

However, entry-level and median wages for both self-employed and traditional wage and salary manicurists and pedicurists are significantly below the living wage for both Los Angeles and Orange counties, as well as the statewide minimum wage (\$14 per hour for employers with 25 employees or less; \$15 per hour for employers with 26 employees or more).⁵

Orange County—The typical entry-level hourly wages for manicurists and pedicurists are \$10.37, which is significantly below the living wage for one adult (\$20.63 in Orange County). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages of \$14.74, which is also significantly lower than the living wage estimate. Orange County's average wages are nearly equivalent to the average statewide wage of \$15.65 for this occupation.

Los Angeles County—The typical entry-level hourly wages for *manicurists and pedicurists* are \$11.50, which is significantly below the living wage for one adult (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages of \$15.69, which is also significantly lower than

the living wage estimate. Los Angeles County's average wages are nearly equivalent to the average statewide wage of \$15.65 for this occupation.

Job Postings

There were 877 online job postings related to manicurists and pedicurists listed in the past 12 months. The highest number of job postings were for nail technicians, manicurists, and pedicurists. The top skills were manicure, pedicure, and cosmetology. The top three employers, by number of job postings, in the region were Soothe, Disneyland Resort, Life Time, and Burke Williams Spa.

Educational Attainment

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists postsecondary nondegree award as the typical entry-level education for *manicurists and pedicurists*. Furthermore, the national-level educational attainment data indicates 24% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education. Only 6% of job postings listed a minimum education requirement. Of those, 81% (50) requested a high school diploma.

Additionally, manicurists and pedicurists must complete a course in nail care from a school approved by the Board of Barbering and Cosmetology in order to be eligible for the licensing examination.⁶

Educational Supply

Community College Supply—Exhibit 2 shows the three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in the related TOP code: Cosmetology and Barbering (3007.00) The colleges with the most completions in the region are: Saddleback, Citrus, and Golden West. Over the past 12 months, there were five other cosmetology-related program recommendation requests from regional community colleges.

It is important to note that the general cosmetology programs listed in Exhibit 2 train for five other occupations not included in this report. There is projected to be over 2,200 annual job openings for these occupations over the next five years. Therefore, supply from general cosmetology programs is overstated and the COE is unable to quantify the supply from these programs that is solely for *manicurists and pedicurists*.

Non-Community College Supply—For a comprehensive regional supply analysis, it is also important to consider the supply from other institutions in the region that provide training programs for manicurists and pedicurists. Exhibit 3 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by these institutions in the related Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) Codes: Cosmetology/Cosmetologist, General (12.0401) and Nail Technician/Specialist and Manicurist (12.0410). Due to different data collection periods, the most recent three-year period of available data is from 2016 to 2019. Between 2016 and 2019, four-year colleges in the region conferred an average of 2,902 awards annually in related training programs.

Of the 2,902 awards conferred by non-community college institutions, 1,582 (55%) were specifically related to nail technicians and manicurists. It is important to note that the general cosmetology programs listed in Exhibit 3 train for five other occupations not included in this report. There is projected to be over 2,200 annual job openings for these occupations over the next five years. Therefore, supply from general cosmetology programs is overstated and the COE is unable to quantify the supply from these programs that is solely for *manicurists and pedicurists*.
