

## Labor Market Analysis: 0850.10 – Sign Language Interpreting

American Sign Language (ASL) Interpreting (Associate Degree and Certificate)

The Los Angeles Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (LA COE) prepared this report to provide regional labor market supply and demand data related to one middle-skill occupation:

• Interpreters and Translators (27-3091): Interpret oral or sign language, or translate written text from one language into another.<sup>1</sup>

Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree.<sup>2</sup> Although *interpreters and translators* typically require a bachelor's degree, it is considered middle-skill because one-third of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree. This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with the relevant occupation.

Based on the available data, there appears to be a supply gap in the region for *interpreters and translators*. In addition to *interpreters and translators* having entry-level wages that exceed the self-sufficiency standard wage in both Los Angeles and Orange counties, at least one-third of workers in the field have completed some college, no degree <u>or</u> an associate degree. **Therefore, due to all of the criteria being met, the LA COE endorses this proposed program**. Detailed reasons include:

Demand:

 Supply Gap Criteria – Over the next five years, 585 jobs are projected to be available annually in the region due to new job growth and replacements, which is more than the three-year average of 110 awards conferred by educational institutions in the region.

<sup>•</sup> All occupations that require a high school diploma or equivalent or no formal education, but also require short- to long-term on-the-job training where multiple community colleges have existing programs.

- Interpreters and translators (SOC 27-3091) includes occupations working in all languages, and not solely American Sign Language (ASL). Therefore, the demand data in this report is overstated.
- Over the past 12 months, there have been 110 online job postings for *interpreters and translators* that listed American Sign Language (ASL) as a skill.
- Living Wage Criteria In Los Angeles County, the typical entry-level hourly wage for interpreters and translators is **\$21.94**, which is above the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult in the region (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County).<sup>3</sup>
- Educational Criteria The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a bachelor's degree as the typical entry-level education for interpreters and translators.
  - However, national-level educational attainment data indicates that 33% of workers in the field have completed some college, no degree <u>or</u> an associate degree.

Supply:

- Between 2018 and 2021, seven (7) community colleges in the greater LA/OC region issued awards in sign language interpreting, conferring an average of 110 awards.
- Between 2017 and 2020, there were no non-community college institutions in the greater LA/OC region that conferred awards in ASL interpreting.

## **Occupational Demand**

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for *interpreters and translators*. In the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, the number of jobs related to this occupation is projected to increase by 15% through 2026. There will be nearly 600 job openings per year through 2026 due to job growth and replacements.

NOTE: Interpreters and translators (SOC 27-3091) includes occupations working in all languages, and not solely American Sign Language (ASL). Therefore, the data in Exhibit 1 is overstated for American Sign Language (ASL) interpreters.

#### Wages

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wage for *interpreters* and *translators* in Los Angeles County, as it relates to the county's self-sufficiency standard wage. Orange County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the greater LA/OC region. Detailed wage information, by county, is included in Appendix A.

**Los Angeles County –** The typical entry-level hourly wage for *interpreters and translators* is \$21.94, which is **above** the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County). Experienced workers can expect to earn approximately \$47.09/hour.

**Orange County –** The typical entry-level hourly wage for *interpreters and translators* is \$20.69, which is <u>above</u> the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$20.63 in Orange County). Experienced workers can expect to earn approximately \$44.23/hour.

# <sup>4</sup> Five-year change represents new job additions to the workforce. Annual openings include new jobs and replacement jobs that result from retirements and separations.

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On average, the entry-level hourly wage for *interpreters and translators* is \$21.65; this is above the self-sufficiency standard wage for one single adult in Los Angeles County (\$18.10). Exhibit 4 shows the average wages for *interpreters and translators*, from entry-level to experienced workers.

#### **Job Postings**

Over the past 12 months, there have been 110 online job postings for *interpreters and translators* that listed American Sign Language (ASL) as a skill. The top skills were customer service, teaching, record keeping, video-remote interpreting (VRI), and troubleshooting technical issues. The top employers, by number of job postings, in the region were Purple Communications, Sorenson Communications, and California State University.

#### **Educational Attainment**

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a bachelor's degree as the typical entry-level education for *interpreters and translators*. However, national-level educational attainment data indicates that 33% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree.

## **Educational Supply**

**Community College Supply** – Exhibit 5 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in Sign Language Interpreting (TOP 0850.10). The colleges with the most completions in the region are Golden West, Mt. San Antonio, and LA Pierce.
