

## Cosmetology and Barbering (TOP 3007.00)

January 2023

Prepared by the South Central Coast Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research

#### **Program Recommendation**

This report was compiled by the South Central Coast<sup>1</sup> Center of Excellence to provide regional labor market data for the program recommendation – Cosmetology and Barbering. This report can help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from programs of study (CCC and non-CCC) that align with this occupation group.

#### **Key Findings**

- In the South Central Coast region, the number of jobs related to Cosmetology and Barbering are expected to increase for all four related occupations.
- Cosmetology and Barbering is anticipated to experience a medium risk of automation for Hairdressers,
  Hairstylists, and Cosmetologists, Makeup Artists, Theatrical and Performance, and Manicurists and
  Pedicurists; as well as a low risk of automation for Skincare Specialists.
- In 2021 there were 534 regional completions in programs related to the occupations identified as aligned with Cosmetology and Barbering and 1,070 openings, indicating an **undersupply**.
- Typical entry-level education is a Postsecondary nondegree award for all four occupations related to Cosmetology and Barbering.
- Completers of Cosmetology and Barbering programs from the 2019-2020 academic year in the South Central Coast region had a median annual wage upon completion of \$17,664.
- 55% of students are **employed within a year** after completing a program.
- Completers experienced an average of +9% change in earnings after exiting.
- 34% of students were part-time, 27% skill builders, 43% first-generation, and 91% economically disadvantaged.

# **Occupation Codes and Descriptions**

There are four occupations in the standard occupational classification (SOC) system that were identified as related to Cosmetology and Barbering for this analysis. The occupation titles and descriptions, as well as reported job titles, are included in Exhibit 1.

## **Earnings**


Exhibit 3 contains hourly wages and annual average earnings for these occupations. Entry-level hourly earnings are represented by the  $25^{th}$  percentile of wages, median hourly earnings are represented by the  $50^{th}$  percentile of wages, and experienced hourly earnings are represented by the  $75^{th}$  percentile of wages, demonstrating various levels of employment.

### **Employer Job Postings**

In this research brief, real-time labor market information is used to provide a more nuanced view of the current job market, as it captures job advertisements for occupations relevant to the field of study. Employer job postings are consulted to understand who is looking for cosmetologists, and what they are looking for in potential candidates. To identify job postings related to Cosmetology and Barbering the following standard occupational classifications were used:

## Skills

The tables in Exhibit 7 list employers' most commonly requested skills in job postings related to Cosmetology and Barbering. Cosmetology is the most sought-after specialized skill for employers, followed by Manicure and Housekeeping. Customer Service, Interpersonal Communication, and Sales were the most requested baseline skills. Software Systems, Spring Framework, and JavaScript (Programming Language) were the most commonly requested software and programming skills.

#### Job Postings - Minimum Educational Attainment Over Time

Exhibit 10 displays the change in job advertisements over the last five years for Cosmetology and Barbering, according to the minimum advertised education. In 2022, there were 47 total job ads posted with a minimum advertised education, with 45 requiring a high school diploma or vocational training.




Exhibit 10 - Educational Demand, Minimum Advertised

To gauge employer preference for candidates with particular education levels, the proportion of job postings by minimum advertised education appears in Exhibit 11. Employers posting job ads for Cosmetology and Barbering have frequently sought candidates with a high school diploma or vocational training.

#### **Student Outcomes**

The CTE LaunchBoard provides student outcome data on the effectiveness of CTE programs. The following student outcome information was collected from regional exiters of Cosmetology and Barbering Programs (TOP: 3007.00) for the 2019-2020 academic year.

- Completers of Cosmetology and Barbering programs from the 2019-2020 academic year in the South Central Coast region had a median annual wage upon completion of \$17,664.
- 55% of students are **employed within a year** after completing a program.
- Completers experienced an average of +9% change in earnings after exiting.
- 34% of students were part-time, 27% skill builders, 43% first-generation, and 91% economically disadvantaged.

#### **Notes**

Data included in this analysis represent the labor market demand for relevant positions most closely related to Cosmetology and Barbering. Traditional labor market information was used to show current and projected employment based on data trends, as well as annual average awards granted by regional community colleges. Real-time labor market information captures job post advertisements for occupations relevant to the field of study and can signal demand and show what employers are looking for in potential employees, but is not a perfect measure of the quantity of open positions. All representations have been produced from primary research and/or secondary review of publicly and/or privately available data and/or research reports. The most recent data available at the time of the analysis was examined; however, data sets are updated regularly and may not be consistent with previous reports. Efforts have been made to qualify and validate the accuracy of the data and findings; however, neither the Centers of Excellence for Labor Market Research (COE), COE host district, nor California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office are responsible for the applications or decisions made by individuals and/or organizations based on this study or its recommendations.
