

# Labor Market Analysis: 1402.00 – Paralegal Paralegal (A.A. degree)

The Los Angeles Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (LA COE) prepared this report to provide regional labor market supply and demand data related to four middle-skill occupations:

- Paralegals and Legal Assistants (23-2011) Assist lawyers by investigating facts, preparing legal documents, or researching legal precedent. Conduct research to support a legal proceeding, to formulate a defense, or to initiate legal action.<sup>1</sup>
- Title Examiners, Abstractors, and Searchers (23-2093) Search real estate records, examine
  titles, or summarize pertinent legal or insurance documents or details for a variety of
  purposes. May compile lists of mortgages, contracts, and other instruments pertaining to
  titles by searching public and private records for law firms, real estate agencies, or title
  insurance companies.<sup>2</sup>
- Court Reporters and Simultaneous Captioners (27-3092) Use verbatim methods and
  equipment to capture, store, retrieve, and transcribe pretrial and trial proceedings or
  other information. Includes stenocaptioners who operate computerized stenographic
  captioning equipment to provide captions of live or prerecorded broadcasts for hearingimpaired viewers.<sup>3</sup>
- Legal Secretaries and Administrative Assistants (43-6012) Perform secretarial duties using legal terminology, procedures, and documents. Prepare legal papers and correspondence, such as summonses, complaints, motions, and subpoenas. May also assist with legal research.<sup>4</sup>

Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree.<sup>5</sup> This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with the relevant occupations.

Based on the available data, there appears to be a supply gap in the region for the occupations of interest. In addition to entry-level wages exceeding the self-sufficiency standard wage in Los Angeles County, the majority of annual openings for the occupations in this report typically require an associate degree or postsecondary nondegree award. **Due to all of the criteria being met, the LA COE endorses this proposed program.** Detailed reasons include:

#### **Demand:**

- Supply Gap Criteria Over the next five years, 3,383 jobs are projected to be
  available annually in the region due to new job growth and replacements, which is
  more than the three-year average of 660 awards conferred by educational institutions
  in the region.
- Living Wage Criteria In Los Angeles County, all four occupations have entry-level wages <u>above</u> the self-sufficiency standard wage (\$18.10/hour).6
- Educational Criteria Within the greater LA/OC region, 63% of the annual job
  openings for middle-skill legal occupations typically require an associate degree or
  postsecondary non-degree award.
  - National-level educational attainment data indicates that between 39% and 70% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree.

#### Supply:

- Between 2018 and 2021, 17 community colleges in the greater LA/OC region issued awards in programs that have historically trained for the occupations of interest, conferring an average of 560 awards.
- Between 2017 and 2020, non-community college institutions throughout the greater LA/OC region conferred an average of 100 awards in relevant programs.

## **Occupational Demand**

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for the four occupations of interest. In the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to increase by 2% through 2026. There will be nearly 3,400 job openings per year through 2026 due to job growth and replacements.

## Wages

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for the occupations of interest in Los Angeles County, as they relate to the county's self-sufficiency standard wage. Orange County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the greater LA/OC region. Detailed wage information, by county, is included in Appendix A.

**Los Angeles County –** All four occupations of interest have entry-level wages above the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County). Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$21.93 and \$23.62. Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$38.52 and \$49.64, which are above the self-sufficiency standard wage estimate.


**Orange County –** All four occupations of interest have entry-level wages that roughly meet or surpass the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$20.63 in Orange County). Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$20.54 and \$22.37. Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$33.80 and \$48.39, which are above the self-sufficiency standard wage estimate.

On average, the entry-level earnings (25<sup>th</sup> percentile) for the occupations in this report are \$22.72. This is above the living wage for one single adult in Los Angeles County (\$18.10). Exhibit 4 shows the hourly wages for the occupations in this report, from entry-level to experienced workers.

#### **Job Postings**

Over the past 12 months, there have been 12,805 online job postings for the occupations of interest. Exhibit 5 displays the number of job postings by occupation. The majority of job postings (77%) were for paralegals and legal assistants. The highest number of job postings were for paralegals, legal assistants, legal secretaries, litigation paralegals, and litigation secretaries. The top skills were litigation, legal documentation, administrative support, legal support, and legal document composition. The top employers, by number of job postings, in the region were Disney, Adams & Martin Group, and First American Corporation.




Exhibit 5: Job postings by occupation (last 12 months)

#### **Educational Attainment**

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists the following typical entry-level education levels for the occupations in this report:

- Associate degree: Paralegals and legal assistants (23-2011)
- Postsecondary nondegree award: Court reporters and simultaneous captioners (27-3092)
- High school diploma or equivalent: Title examiners, abstractors, and searchers (23-2093) and legal secretaries and administrative assistants (43-6012)

In the greater LA/OC region, the majority of annual job openings (63%) typically require an associate degree or postsecondary nondegree award. National-level educational attainment data indicates that between 39% and 70% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree.

# **Educational Supply**

**Community College Supply –** Exhibit 6 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in programs that have historically trained for the occupations of interest. The colleges with the most completions in the region are Santa Ana, Pasadena, and Cerritos. Of the 560 community college awards averaged over the last three years, nearly half of these conferred awards were associate degrees (265 awards).


**Non-Community College Supply –** For a comprehensive education supply analysis, it is important to consider the supply from other institutions in the region that provide training programs for the occupations of interest. Exhibit 7 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by these institutions in relevant programs. Due to different data collection periods, the most recent three-year period of available data is from 2017 to 2020. Between 2017 and 2020, non-community college institutions in the region conferred an average of 100 awards.
