The South Central Coast Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (SCC COE) prepared this report to determine whether there is a supply gap in the SCC regional labor market related to two middle-skill occupations:

- *Food Service Managers* (11-9051)
- *Chefs and Head Cooks* (35-1011)

Based on the available data there appears to be a supply gap for these culinary management occupations and typical education requirements for these occupations align with a community college education. However, the majority of annual job openings have entry-level wages below the Self-Sufficiency Standard living wage. **Therefore, due to some of the regional labor market criteria being met, the COE endorses this proposed program.**

<sup>1</sup> The living wage endorsement criteria in this report uses the University of Washington's Center for Women's Welfare Self-Sufficiency Standard, which the COE refers to as a living wage; the living wage for Los Angeles, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, and Ventura counties, last updated in March 2024.

#### Demand:

- The number of jobs related to these culinary management occupations is projected to increase 6% through 2029 in the SCC region. There is projected to be 553 annual job openings due to retirements and replacements.
- Hourly entry-level wages for these culinary management occupations in Santa Barbara County range from \$25.06 to \$27.73; all (100%) annual job openings have entry-level wages significantly below the Self-Sufficiency Standard living wage (\$29.80 for Santa Barbara County).
- There were 1,949 online job postings for these culinary management occupations over the past 12 months. The highest number of postings were for general managers, shift runners, and restaurant managers.
- The typical entry-level education for these culinary management occupations is a high school diploma or equivalent.
- Between 36% and 38% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education.

#### Supply:

- There was an average of 179 awards conferred by six community colleges in the SCC Region from 2021 to 2024.
- Non-community college institutions did not confer any related awards from 2020 to 2023.
- According to the Chancellor’s Office Curriculum Inventory (COCI) data, there are currently no courses or programs offered under the Dietetic Services and Management (1306.20) TOP code in the SCC Region. Therefore, student outcomes data is unavailable for all metrics at the district and regional level.

### Demand

#### Occupational Projections:

Exhibit 2 compares historical and projected changes in employment for these occupations compared to the number of jobs in 2019. Notably, employment for these culinary management occupations in Northern LA County grew 25% from 2019 to 2024, which is significantly higher when compared to employment for these occupations in California, the

SCC Region, and all other counties in the SCC region. From 2024 to 2029, employment for these culinary management occupations is projected to steadily grow in all areas.

Exhibit 2: Historical and Projected Employment for Culinary Management Occupations in the SCC Region, 2019-2029

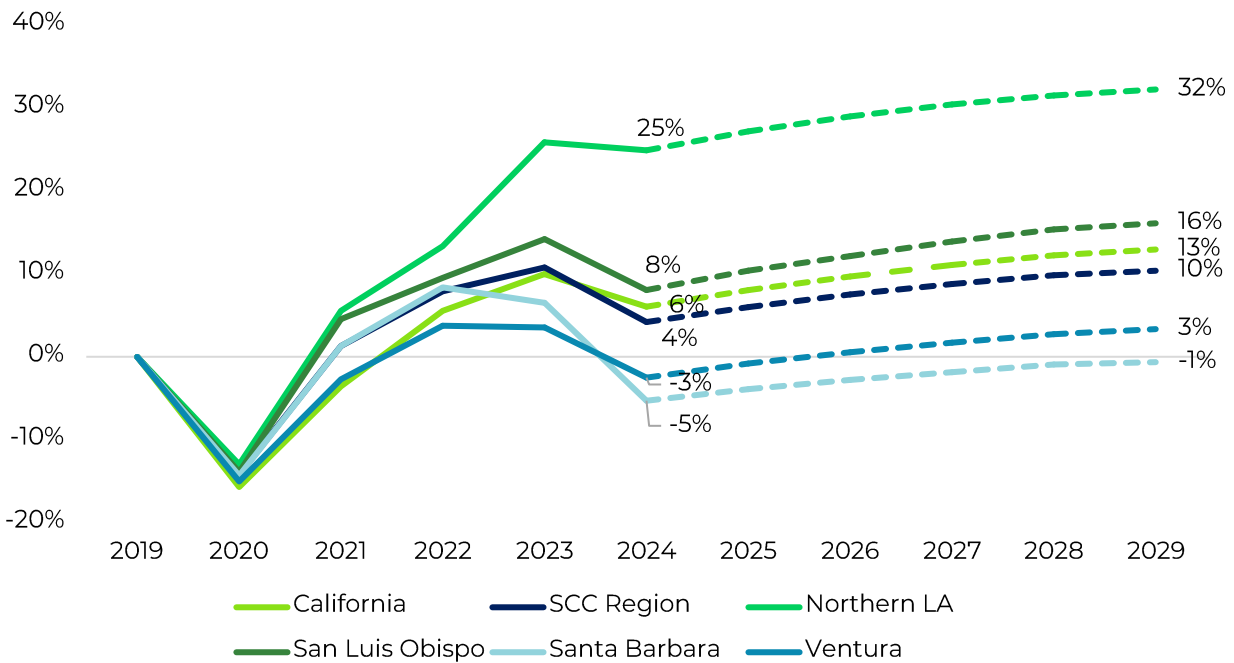


Exhibit 3 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for these culinary management occupations. In the SCC Region, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to increase 6% through 2029. There are projected to be 553 jobs available annually. Ventura County has the highest number of jobs and annual openings. Employment in all regions is projected to steadily grow through 2029.

### Wages:

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for these culinary management occupations in relation to the living wage of the county where the requesting community college is located. This report was requested by Allan Hancock College, which is in Santa Barbara County. Wages for other counties are included below to provide a complete analysis of the SCC Region.

In addition to the Self Sufficiency Standard living wage, data for the MIT Living Wage, updated on February 10, 2025, is provided as a reference. Currently, the MIT Living Wage in

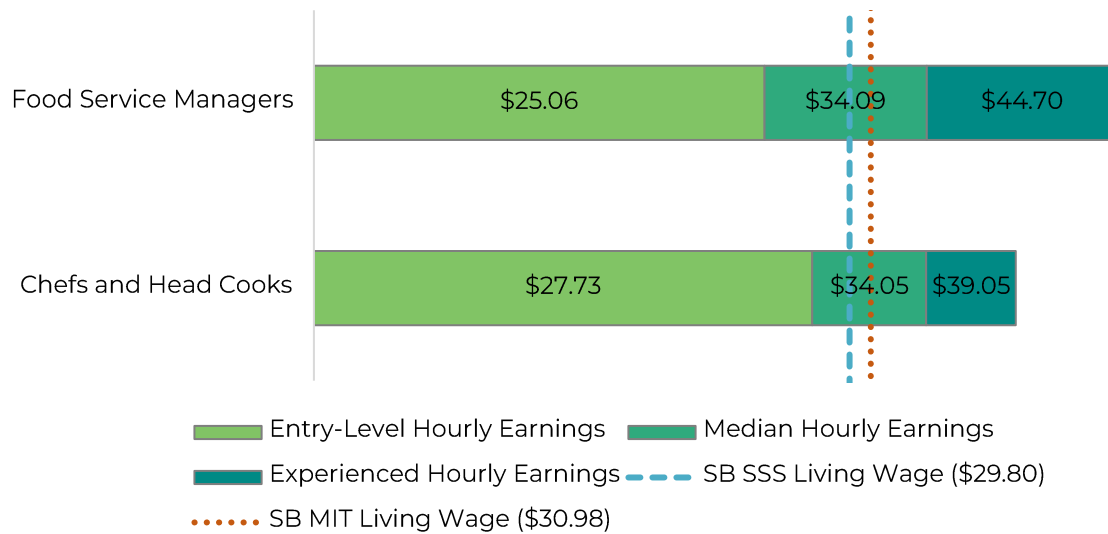

Santa Barbara County is \$30.98. Both figures account for geographic-specific costs of necessities such as housing, food, health care, and transportation to assess the cost of living, and are notated in the exhibits below.

### Santa Barbara

All (100%) annual openings for these culinary management occupations have entry-level wages below the Self-Sufficiency Standard living wage for one adult (\$29.80 in Santa Barbara County). Typical entry-level hourly wages range between \$25.06 and \$27.73. Median hourly earnings for these culinary management occupations in Santa Barbara County are above the living wage. Exhibit 4 shows the wage range for each of these culinary management occupations in Santa Barbara County and how they compare to the regional living wage, sorted from lowest to highest entry-level wage.

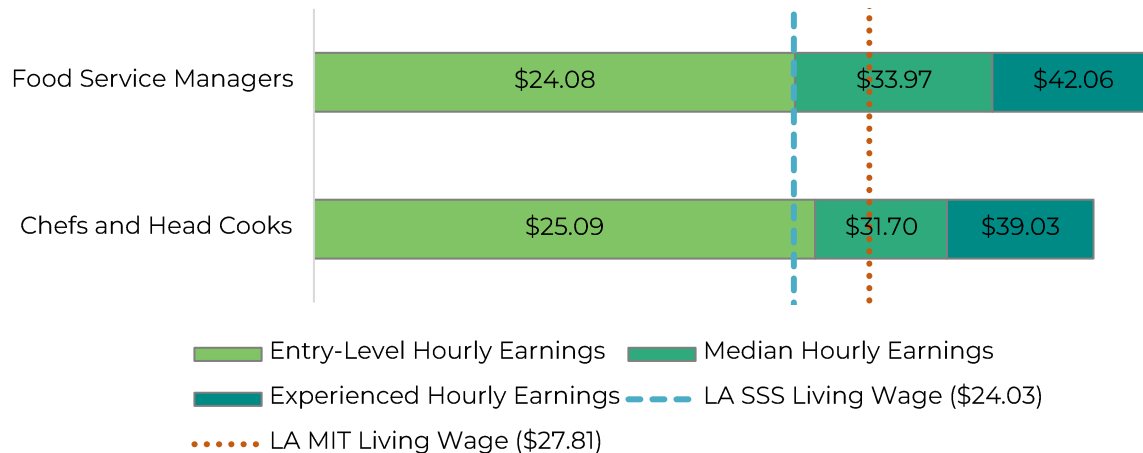
Exhibit 4: Wages by Occupation in Santa Barbara County



## Northern Los Angeles

All (100%) annual openings for these culinary management occupations have entry-level wages below the Self-Sufficiency Standard living wage for one adult (\$24.03 in Los Angeles County). Typical entry-level hourly wages range between \$24.08 and \$25.09. Exhibit 5 shows the wage range for each of these culinary management occupations in Northern Los Angeles and how they compare to the regional living wage, sorted from lowest to highest entry-level wage.

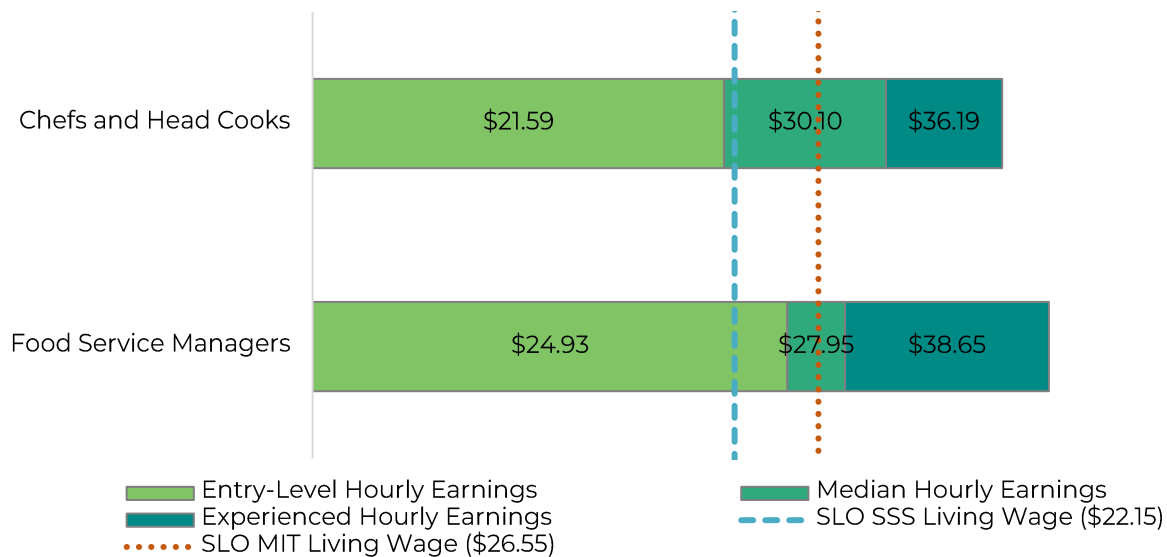
Exhibit 5: Wages by Occupation in Northern Los Angeles County



## San Luis Obispo

The majority (57%) of annual openings for these culinary management occupations have entry-level wages above the Self-Sufficiency Standard living wage for one adult (\$22.15 in San Luis Obispo County). Typical entry-level hourly wages range between \$21.59 and \$24.93. Exhibit 6 shows the wage range for each of these culinary management occupations in San Luis Obispo County and how they compare to the regional living wage, sorted from lowest to highest entry-level wage.

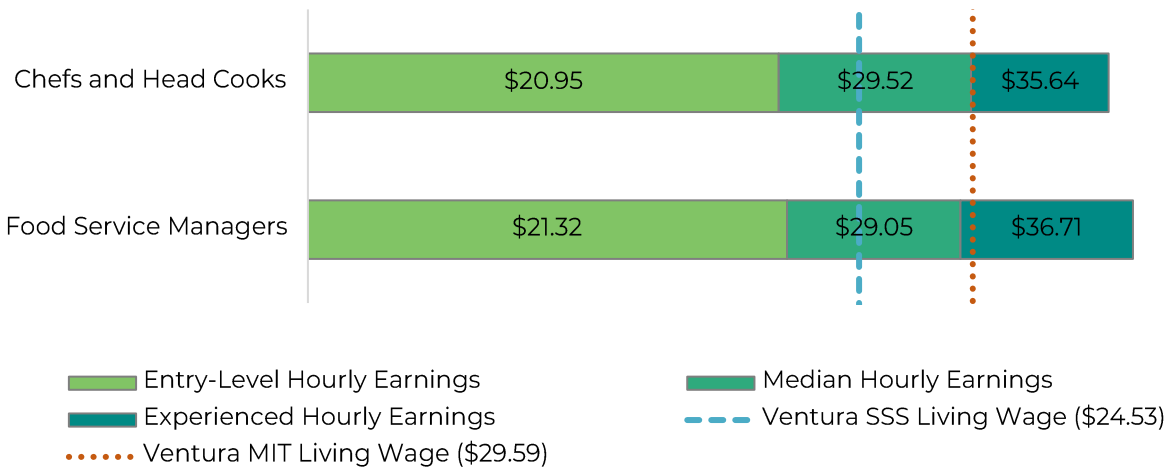
Exhibit 6: Wages by Occupation in San Luis Obispo County



## Ventura

All (100%) annual openings for these culinary management occupations have entry-level wages below the Self-Sufficiency Standard living wage for one adult (\$24.53 in Ventura County). Typical entry-level hourly wages range between \$20.95 and \$21.32. Median hourly earnings for these culinary management occupations in Ventura County are above the living wage. Exhibit 7 shows the wage range for each of these culinary management occupations in Ventura County and how they compare to the regional living wage, sorted from lowest to highest entry-level wage.

## Job Postings:

There were 1,949 online job postings related to these culinary management occupations listed in the past 12 months in the SCC Region. Exhibit 8 shows the number of job postings by county. Approximately 37% of job postings were in Ventura County.

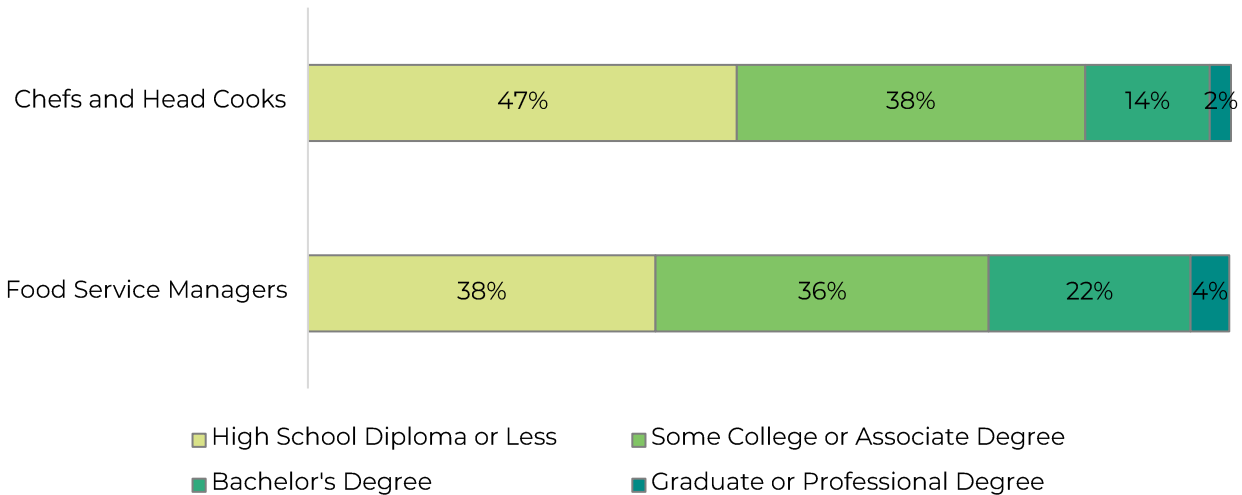
## Educational Attainment:

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists the following as the typical entry-level education for these culinary management occupations:

- High School Diploma or Equivalent
  - *Food Service Managers (11-9051)*
  - *Chefs and Head Cooks (35-1011)*

The national-level educational attainment data indicates between 36% and 38% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education. Exhibit 12 shows the educational attainment for each occupation, sorted by highest community college educational attainment to lowest.

Of the 31% of the cumulative job postings for these culinary management occupations that listed a minimum education requirement in the SCC Region, 79% (471) requested a high school diploma or an associate degree, 21% (125) requested a bachelor's degree, and 0% (0) requested a graduate or professional degree.

### Community College Supply:

Exhibit 13 shows the three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in the related TOP codes:

- Culinary Arts (1306.30)
- Hospitality (1307.00)
- Restaurant and Food Services and Management (1307.10)

No awards were conferred for the following TOP codes:

- Dietetic Services and Management (1306.20)

The college with the most completions in the region is College of the Canyons (56), followed by Cuesta (52), and Allan Hancock (26).

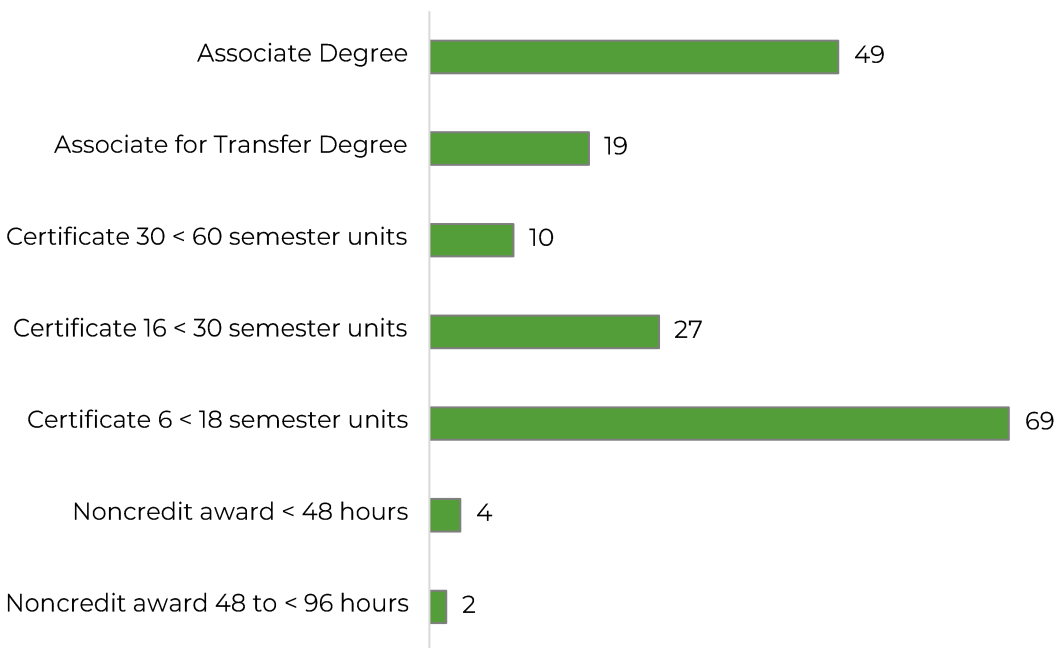

units, followed by associate degrees and certificates between 16 and less than 30 semester units.

### Community College Student Outcomes:

A review of Chancellor’s Office Curriculum Inventory (COCI) data shows that there are currently no community colleges in the SCC Region that offer Dietetic Services and Management (1306.20) programs or courses. Therefore, there is no student outcomes data for this TOP Code.

Exhibit 15 shows the Strong Workforce Program (SWP) metrics for Dietetic Services and Management (1306.20) students statewide. Throughout the state, there were 3,437 Dietetic Services and Management (1306.20) students in the 2023-24 academic year. Statewide students that exited Dietetic Services and Management (1306.20) programs had median annual earnings of \$35,730 (or \$17.18 per hour) and 29% attained the living wage. Approximately 68% of Dietetic Services and Management (1306.20) students reported they were employed in their field of study.

### Non-Community College Supply:

To comprehensively analyze the regional supply, it is crucial to include data from other institutions offering culinary management training programs. Over the past three years (2020-2023), there were no awards conferred by non-community college institutions under the related Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) codes:

- Restaurant, Culinary, and Catering Managers (12.0504)

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the 2023-24 academic year. Statewide students that exited Dietetic Services and Management (1306.20) programs had median annual earnings of \$35,730 (or \$17.18 per hour) and 29% attained the living wage. Approximately 68% of Dietetic Services and Management (1306.20) students reported they were employed in their field of study. Exhibit 15 as “data unavailable.” Data may not be available for various reasons, including cases where data is masked to protect personally identifiable information.

## Regional Demographics

As noted above in the Community College Supply section, there are currently no programs or courses offered under the Dietetic Services and Management (1306.20) TOP Code in the SCC Region. Therefore, there is no student demographic data for this TOP Code.

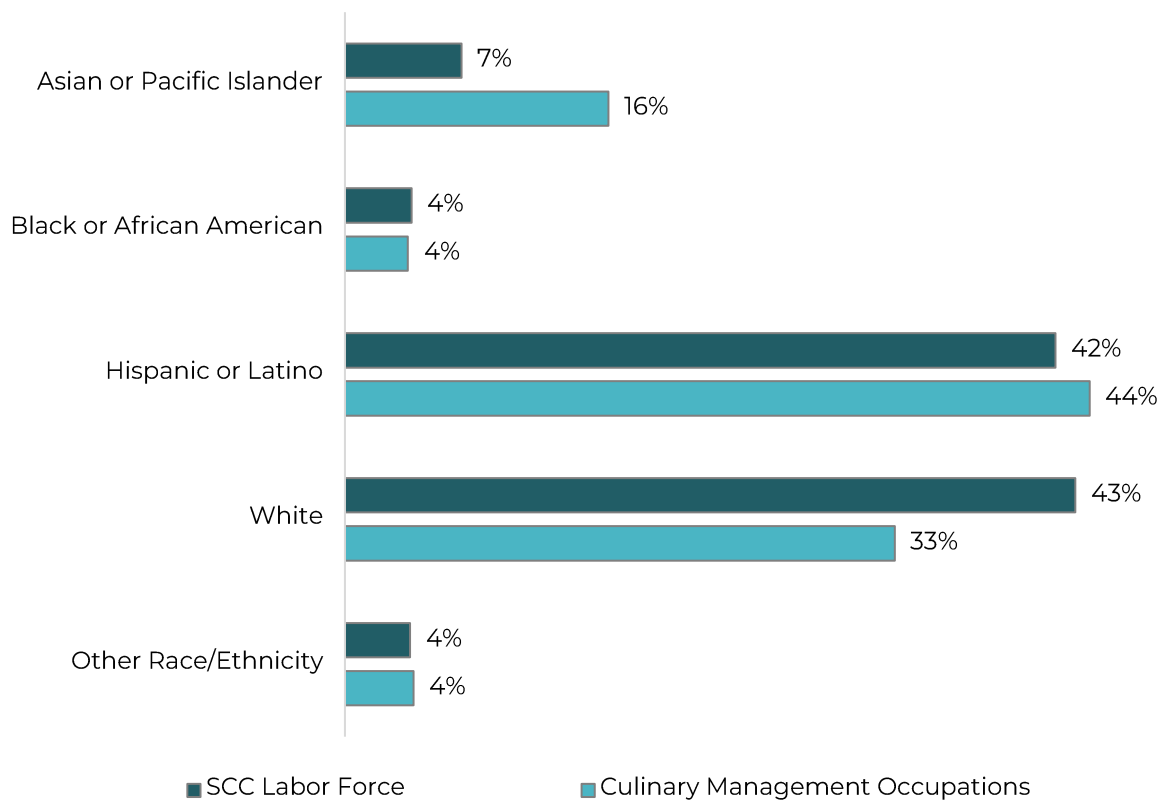
This section examines demographic data for the SCC labor force, along with occupational data, to identify potential diversity and equity issues addressable by community college programs.

### Ethnicity:

Exhibit 16 compares the ethnicity of the overall SCC labor force, and occupation-specific data for the two culinary management occupations included in this report.

Approximately 16% of culinary management workers are Asian or Pacific Islander, which is significantly higher than the overall SCC labor force (4%). Additionally, 33% of culinary management workers are white, which is lower compared to the labor force (43%).

Exhibit 16: Program and County Demographics by Ethnicity

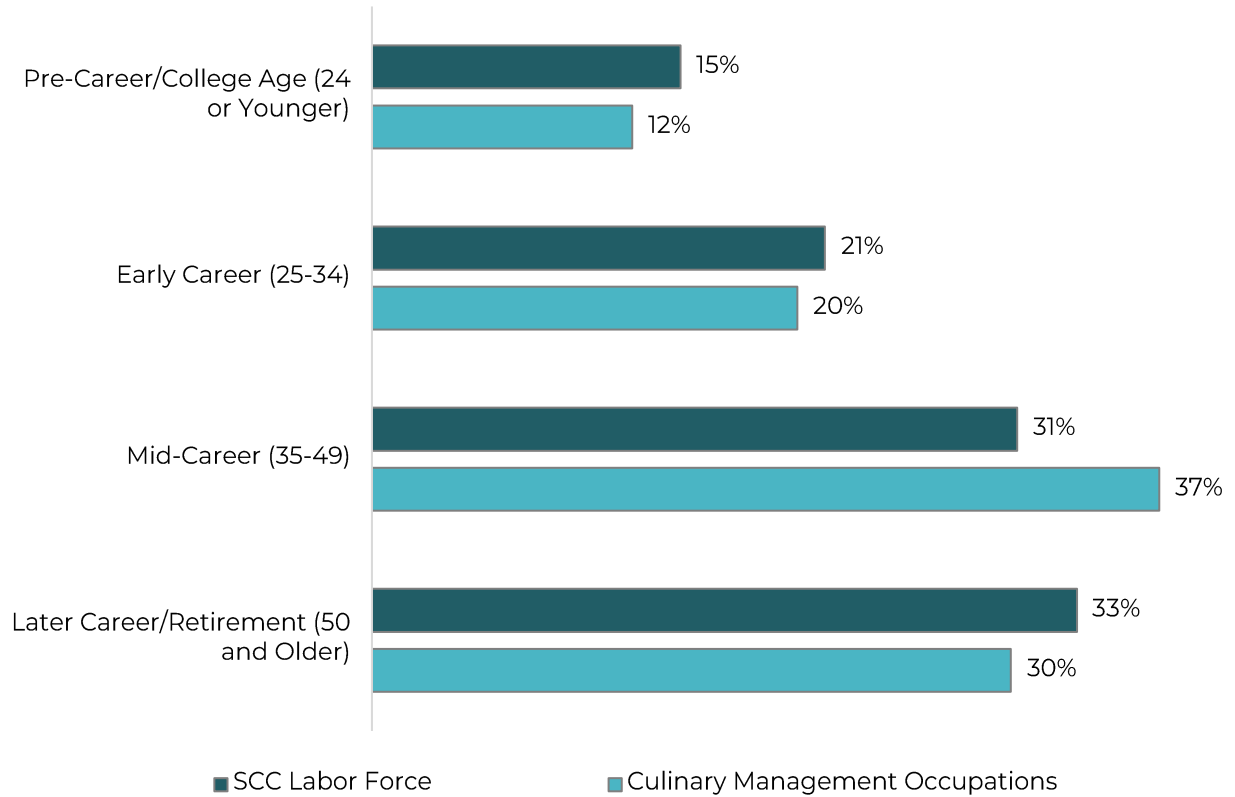


## Age:

Exhibit 17 compares the age of the overall SCC labor force and occupation-specific data for the two culinary management occupations included in this report.

Approximately 37% of workers in culinary management occupations are Mid-Career (35-49) age, which is higher than the labor force (31%).

Exhibit 17: Program and County Demographics by Age

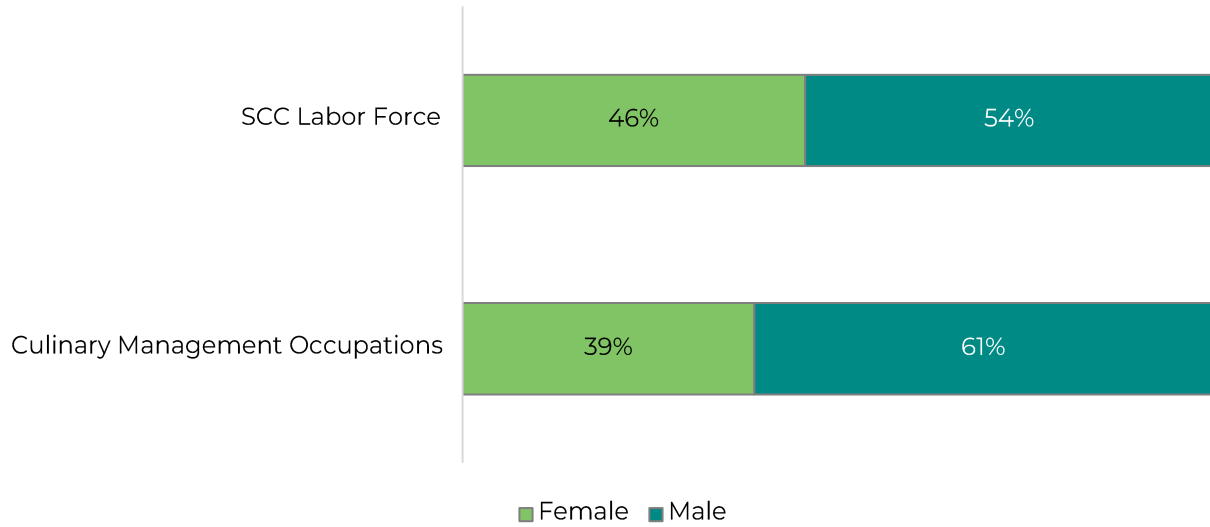


**Sex:**

Exhibit 18 compares the sex of the overall SCC labor force and occupation-specific data for the two culinary management occupations included in this report.

There is a significant majority of male workers in culinary management (61%), which contrasts with the overall labor force (54% male).

## Appendix A: Methodology

### Traditional Labor Market Data

The SCC COE prepared this report by analyzing data from occupations and education programs. Occupational data is derived from Lightcast, a labor market analytics firm that consolidates data from the California Employment Development Department (EDD), U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and other government agencies.

Data included in this analysis represents the labor market demand for relevant positions most closely related to the proposed program as expressed by the requesting college in consultation with the SCC COE. Traditional labor market information was used to show current and projected employment based on data trends, as well as annual average awards granted by regional community colleges.

Program supply data is drawn from two systems: Taxonomy of Programs (TOP) and Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP).

Using a TOP-SOC crosswalk, the SCC COE identified middle-skill jobs for which programs within these TOP codes train. Middle-skill jobs include:

- All occupations that require an educational requirement of some college, associate degree or apprenticeship;
- All occupations that require a bachelor's degree, but also have more than one-third of their existing labor force with an educational attainment of some college or associate degree; or
- All occupations that require a high school diploma or equivalent or no formal education, but also require short- to long-term on-the-job training where multiple community colleges have existing programs.

The SCC COE determined labor market supply for an occupation or SOC code by analyzing the number of program completers or awards in a related TOP or CIP code. The COE developed a "supply table" with this information, which is the source of the program supply data for this report. TOP code data comes from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office MIS Data Mart ([datamart.cccco.edu](http://datamart.cccco.edu)) and CIP code data comes from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System ([nces.ed.gov/ipeds/use-the-data](http://nces.ed.gov/ipeds/use-the-data)), also known as IPEDS.

TOP is a system of numerical codes used at the state level to collect and report information on California community college programs and courses throughout the state that have similar outcomes. CIP codes are a taxonomy of academic disciplines at institutions of higher education in the United States and Canada. Institutions outside of the California Community College system do not use TOP codes in their reporting systems.

### Online Job Postings Data

Online job postings data, also known as real-time labor market information, captures job post advertisements for occupations relevant to the field of study which can signal demand and show what employers are looking for in potential employees but is not a perfect measure of the quantity of open positions. Online job postings data is sourced from Lightcast, a labor market analytics firm that scrapes, collects, and organizes data from online job boards such as LinkedIn, Indeed, Glassdoor, Monster, GovernmentJobs.com, and thousands more.

There are several limitations when analyzing job postings. A single job posting may not represent a single job opening, as employers may be creating a pool of candidates for future openings or hiring for multiple positions with a single posting. Additionally, not all jobs are posted online, and jobs may be filled through other methods such as internal promotion, word-of-mouth advertising, physical job boards, or a variety of other channels.

Additionally, Lightcast uses natural language processing (NLP) to determine the related company, industry, occupation, and other information for each job posting. However, NLP has limitations that include understanding contextual words of phrases; determining differences in words that can be used as nouns, verbs, and/or adjectives; and misspellings or grammatical errors.<sup>5</sup> For these reasons, job postings could be assigned to the wrong employer, industry, or occupation within Lightcast’s database.

## Geography

The South Central Coast region encompasses San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, and Ventura counties, as well as parts of Northern Los Angeles County. Exhibit 19 shows the 34 ZIP codes used to define Northern Los Angeles County.

Though traditional labor market information is available at the ZIP code level, it does not always add up to data reported at the county level for multiple reasons:

- ZIP codes are not official geographically bounded areas, unlike states and counties.
- ZIP codes may cross county lines, such as ZIP code 93461, which is primarily in San Luis Obispo County, but also crosses into Kern County.

For these reasons, the number of jobs and average annual openings for each county may not add up to the total for the SCC Region. However, considering jobseekers may cross county lines for opportunities, the traditional labor market data is reflective of opportunities available to jobseekers in the SCC Region.

Additionally, job postings data is available only at the city or county level. To analyze job postings for the entire SCC region, the SCC COE developed a list of cities available in Lightcast for analysis. Additionally, demographic data is not available at the ZIP code level but is available at the Census Bureau’s Public Use Microdata Area (PUMA) level. Demographic data was sourced via IPUMS and analyzed by the SCC COE.
