SUMMARY

This report analyzes whether local labor market demand is being met by community college programs aligned with the identified middle-skill occupations¹ or whether a shortage of workers exists. Labor market demand is measured by annual job openings while education supply is measured by the number of awards (degrees and certificates) conferred on average each year.

Based on the available data, there does not appear to be a supply gap for the five identified middle-skill occupations in the region. While the number of awards conferred is greater than the number of job openings, the talent supply is within the COE's acceptable margin (the number of the number of awards issued is 25% over or under the number of annual openings) and is therefore considered "supply met" rather than a "supply gap." For this reason, real-time labor market data is included in this report as well – to provide a more nuanced view of the regional job market for middle-skill film and media production occupations. Furthermore, the majority of annual openings have entry-level wages that exceed the self-sufficiency standard wage in Los Angeles County, and more than one-third of current workers in the field have completed an associate degree or less educational attainment.

¹ Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree. The COE classifies middle-skill jobs as the following:

- All occupations that require an educational requirement of some college, associate degree or apprenticeship;
- All occupations that require a bachelor's degree, but also have more than one-third of their existing labor force with an educational attainment of some college or associate degree; or
- All occupations that require a high school diploma or equivalent or no formal education, but also require short- to long-term on-the-job training where multiple community colleges have existing programs.

Recommendation: Due to two program endorsement criteria being met, the Los Angeles Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (LA COE) endorses this proposed program.

Key Findings

Supply Gap

- 2,201 annual job openings are projected in the region through 2029. This number is less than the three-year average of 2,784 awards conferred by educational institutions in the region.
 - Although there are nearly the same number of awards conferred as job openings, the data suggests that the **demand has been met for these occupations within the LA/OC region** since the three-year average number of awards (supply) is within the COE's 25% margin of annual job openings (demand).
 - Over the past 12 months, there were **3,047 online job postings related to these film production occupations**. The highest number of job postings were for video editors, videographers, audiovisual technicians, videographers/editors and home theater specialists.

Living Wage

- 64% of annual job openings for these middle-skill film and media production occupations have entry-level wages **above** Los Angeles County's self-sufficiency standard hourly wage (\$24.03/hour). ²

Educational Attainment

- 54% of the annual job openings typically require a bachelor's degree for middle-skill occupations related to film and media production in the LA/OC region.
- 34%-55% of workers in the field have completed an associate degree or less educational attainment, according to national educational attainment data.

Community college supply

- 19 community colleges issued awards related to film and media production in the greater LA/OC region.
- 1,078 awards (degrees and certificates) were conferred on average each year between 2023 and 2025.

Other postsecondary supply

- 20 educational institutions in the LA/OC region have conferred awards in programs related to film and media production over the past three years.
- 1,706 awards were conferred on average each year by other postsecondary institutions throughout the greater LA/OC region between 2022 and 2024.

TARGET OCCUPATIONS

LA COE prepared this report to provide regional labor market and postsecondary supply data related to five middle-skill occupations. Although some of the occupations in this report typically require a bachelor's degree, they are considered middle-skill because approximately one-third of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree. - **Audio and Video Technicians (27-4011)** ³
- **Sound Engineering Technicians (27-4014)** ⁴
- **Lighting Technicians (27-4015)** ⁵
- **Camera Operators, Television, Video, and Film (27-4031)** ⁶
- **Film and Video Editors (27-4032)** ⁷

OCCUPATIONAL DEMAND

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for these middle-skill film and media production occupations. In the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to decrease by 8% through 2029. However, there will be more than 2,200 job openings per year through 2029 due to retirements and workers leaving the field. The majority of jobs in 2024 for these middle-skill film and media production occupations (92%) were located in Los Angeles County.

Detailed Occupation Data

Exhibit 2 displays the current employment and projected occupational demand for each of the target occupations in Los Angeles County. The average percentage of workers aged 55+ across all occupations in the Los Angeles/Orange County region is 26%; occupations with a larger share of workers aged 55 and older typically have greater replacement needs to offset the amount of impending retirements. On average, 81% of workers across all occupations in California are employed full-time.

WAGES

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for these target occupations in Los Angeles County as they relate to the county's self-sufficiency standard wage. Orange County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region.

Los Angeles County

The majority, 64%, of annual openings for these target occupations have entry-level wages above the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$24.03 in Los Angeles County). Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$21.96 and \$27.31. (Exhibit 3).

Three occupations have entry-level wages above the self-sufficiency standard wage:

- *Film and video editors*, \$27.31
- *Camera operators, television, video, and film*, \$27.22
- *Lighting technicians*, \$25.03

Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$49.13 and \$61.80, which are higher than the self-sufficiency standard.

Orange County

All five occupations have entry-level wages below the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$27.13 in Orange County). Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$20.06 and \$22.29 (Exhibit 4). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$44.69 and \$55.61, which are higher than the self-sufficiency standard.

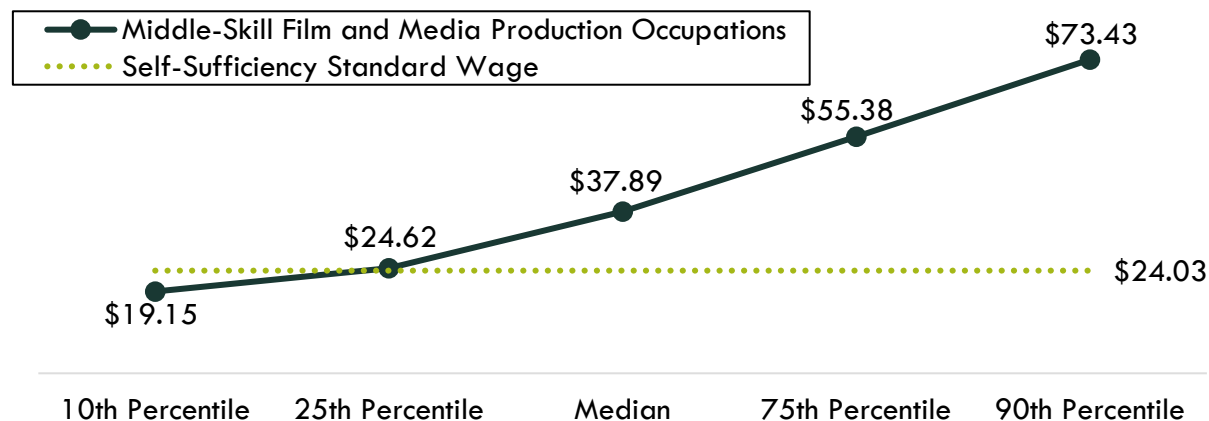

Across the greater Los Angeles and Orange County region, the average entry-level hourly earnings for the occupations in this report are \$24.62; this is above the living wage for one single adult in Los Angeles County (\$24.03). Exhibit 5 shows the average hourly wage for the occupations in this report, for entry-level to experienced workers.

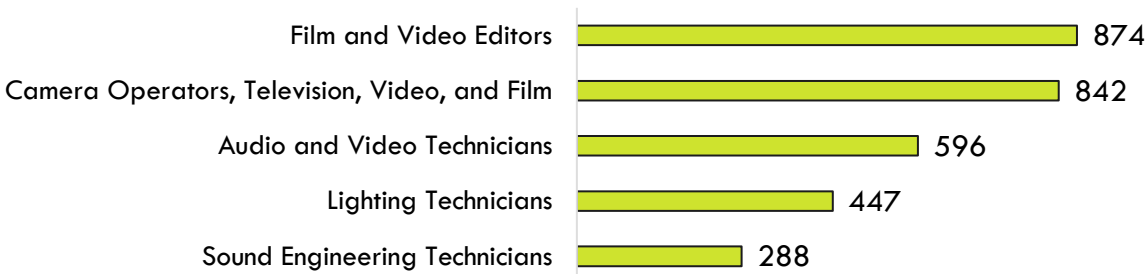
Exhibit 5: Average hourly earnings for target occupations, Los Angeles and Orange counties



JOB POSTINGS

There were 3,047 online job postings related to film and media production listed in the past 12 months in Los Angeles and Orange counties. Exhibit 6 displays the number of job postings by occupation. The majority of job postings (29%) were for *film and video editors*, followed by *camera operators, television, video, and film* (28%) and *audio and video technicians* (20%).

In the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, 22% of the target job postings listed a minimum educational requirement. Exhibit 8 details the number and percentage of job postings by educational level.

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

In the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, the majority of annual job openings (54%) typically require a bachelor's degree (Exhibit 9). However, the national-level data indicates between 34% and 55% of workers in the field have completed an associate degree or less education as their highest level of educational attainment. The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists the following typical entry-level education levels for the occupations in this report:

Community College Supply

Other Postsecondary Supply

For a comprehensive regional supply analysis, it is important to consider the supply from other institutions in the region that provide training programs for film and media production. Exhibit 12 shows the number of awards conferred by these institutions in relevant programs. Due to different data collection periods, the most recent data is from 2022 to 2024. Between 2022 and 2024, other postsecondary college institutions in the region conferred an average of 1,706 bachelor's and sub-baccalaureate awards. Sub-baccalaureate awards include associate degrees, postsecondary awards, and other academic awards that typically take fewer than four years to complete.

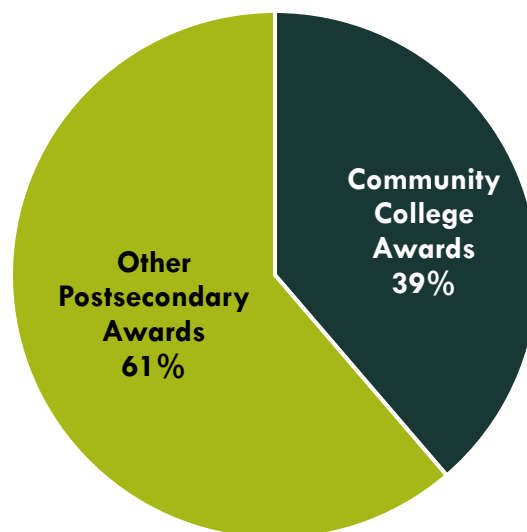

APPENDIX: OCCUPATION DESCRIPTIONS

LA COE prepared this report to provide regional labor market supply and demand data related to these target occupations:

- **Audio and Video Technicians (27-4011)** Set up, maintain, and dismantle audio and video equipment, such as microphones, sound speakers, connecting wires and cables, sound and mixing boards, video cameras, video monitors and servers, and related electronic equipment for live or recorded events, such as concerts, meetings, conventions, presentations, podcasts, news conferences, and sporting events. ¹⁰

- **Sound Engineering Technicians (27-4014)** Assemble and operate equipment to record, synchronize, mix, edit, or reproduce sound, including music, voices, or sound effects, for theater, video, film, television, podcasts, sporting events, and other productions. ¹¹
- **Lighting Technicians (27-4015)** Set up, maintain, and dismantle light fixtures, lighting control devices, and the associated lighting electrical and rigging equipment used for photography, television, film, video, and live productions. May focus or operate light fixtures or attach color filters or other lighting accessories. ¹²
- **Camera Operators, Television, Video, and Film (27-4031)** Operate television, video, or film camera to record images or scenes for television, video, or film productions. ¹³
- **Film and Video Editors (27-4032)** Edit moving images on film, video, or other media. May work with a producer or director to organize images for final production. May edit or synchronize soundtracks with images. ¹⁴
